

FOREWORD

Liturgically, the great work of the Church in the final quarter of the twentieth century is to bring into practice the changes suggested by the Second Vatican Council. In the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, the Council called for congregational singing as participation in worship and as something to be encouraged. Subsequent documents from the Sacred Congregation of Rites and from the National Conference of Catholic Bishops have made this call more explicit.

This book represents a carefully researched and experimentally tested response to this call of the Council. Theodore Marier, its compiler, is rightly recognized for his leadership and creativity in religious music. In this volume, he has brought together all that is needed for a complete program of congregational singing. He offers a musical format for the Order of Mass in which the congregation can easily participate. He provides liturgically appropriate musical settings for a wide range of services as well as an excellent selection of hymns.

This book offers much to Catholic worship. It fills the great need for a structured program which acan assist in the development of congregations that feel comfortable with sung participation in the Liturgy.

The experience of the materials in this book has greatly enriched the worship at St. Paul's Church in Cambridge, Massachusetts. This community has become more and more aware of how much it is tstrengthened and enriched in its prayer by the ability of the entire congregation to express its faith land devotion in song.

Hopefully, the wide distribution of *Hymns, Psalms and Spiritual Canticles* will provide similar experiences to great numbers of worshipers. May it open to us something of what St. Paul meant when he exhorted the Colossians to "Let the word of Christ dwell in you abundantly; in all wisdom teach and admonish one another by hymns, psalms and spiritual canticles, singing in your hearts to God by his grace."

PREFACE

This parish manual has been developed and tested through two decades of continuous daily use at the Church of St. Paul, Cambridge, Mass. The music is designed primarily for singing by cantor, celebrant and congregation with and without choir. When a choir is present, the manual provides numerous optional choral settings as musical enrichments of the liturgical prayers. For example, as options, the choir can sing descants to the gospel and other acclamations; four-part (SATB) settings for psalm verses; through-composed compositions for choir and congregation of the responsorial psalms of major feasts; and parts of the Mass ordinary, some in simple and others in more elaborate settings for choir, congregation and organ.

The grade of difficulty of the music ranges from the very simple to the more complex. For example, there are one-note recitations of the *Glory to God* and *We Believe*, and simple chant-like antiphons and refrains. There are also technically more demanding compositions in contemporary polyphonic style by Anton Heiller, Jean Langlais and Russell Woollen. At whatever level of difficulty, the music includes a part for the people.

For the "core" programs of the Mass, Responsorial Psalms, Morning and Evening Prayer (Service of Light), Compline (Night Prayer) and other services of communal worship, the musical style is consistently homogeneous. Experience has shown that stylistic uniformity builds familiarity and thus eases the day-to-day rendition of new musical settings of liturgical texts. There is, moreover, musical provided for every liturgical event indicated in both the Lectionary and the Sacramentary.

ORDER OF MASS

Simple chant-like melodies with organ accompaniments are provided for all the sung priest-people dialogues, starting with "In the name of the Father..." at the beginning of Mass, to "The Mass is ended..." The complete setting of the Order of Mass in Latin follows the same style, starting with "In nomine Patris..." to the final "Ite, missa est... Deo gratias". For the sake of variety, and offering opportunities for expanding the people's repertory of music that is sung during Mass, the manual contains numerous alternate settings of the Mass texts that include unison melodies, polyphonic compositions for choir-organ-congregation, and Gregorian Chants.

HYMNS

From the rich store of classical and contemporary Christian hymnody, the manual offers 370 l hymns, providing suitable texts and tunes for all occasions of worship. The harmonizations of many of the traditional chorales are by J.S. Bach, and the hymn tunes of later composers are given either in their traditional arrangements or in carefully prepared settings. Contemporary poets, imbued with a sense of the Church's mainstream theology, have provided texts that are rich in imagery and rhythmic vitality. Along side of such classical texts as O God, Our Help in Ages Past by Isaac Watts, Godhead Here in Hiding by Gerard Manley Hopkins, and At the Name of Jesus by Caroline Noël, the hymn section of the manual offers numerous contemporary texts such as O God, from Whom Mankind Derives its Name by Frederick Kaan, O Lord, You Are My God by John Dunn, Think of the Son of God, an ancient Gaelic poem translated by Douglas Hyde, and O God of Light by James Quinn, S.J.

The first lines of hymns as titles are presented in alphabetical sequence to facilitate locating a particular hymn. At the same time, the hymns have been arranged to avoid page turns wherever possible. Many of the hymn texts are metrical paraphrases of psalms. These were carefully researched and selected to offer practical alternatives to the prose psalm settings. Experience has shown that some congregations are more comfortable singing tunes and texts that have a regular recurring pulse than they are when singing tunes and texts in free rhythm. In choosing these metrical settings, care was taken to include all the "common" psalms for the seasons and feasts shown in the Lectionary.

PSALMS

The psalms are presented in numerical order. The translations have been drawn from a variety of sources such as the *New American Bible*, the *Revised Standard Version of the Bible, The Psalms* by Mary Perkins Ryan, *The Grail, Psalms for Modern Man*, and the Latin Vulgate. With the permission of the copyright owners, some transpositions of the phrases were made in selected psalms in order to accommodate the musical cadences. In some psalms, also with permission, a non-restrictive language was adopted except where texts are under copyright limitations. The numberings of the psalms and verses are given according to the printed texts of the source books. A psalm with its proper or appropriate antiphon is given for every occasion listed in the *Lectionary*.

MISCELLANEOUS LITURGIES

There is a musical setting in the manual for every rite given in the *Sacramentary*. For ease of rendering by parish groups, both Morning and Evening Prayer are offered in the form of "core" programs. Night Prayer, with psalm options, is presented as in the *Breviary*. The complete texts of all four Passions of Our Lord are given full musical settings, suitable for singing by congregation and three cantors.

READINGS

For private reading or for group recitation, there are some 40 selections from the Old and New Testaments, from the recently discovered *Odes of Solomon*, with their inspiring Christological orientation, together with several quotations from the *Imitation of Christ* by Gerard Groote. Accompanied by soft organ music, these readings serve as excellent Communion meditations, especially when selected to accent the theme of a particular celebration.

INDICES

Fourteen indices expose the content and function of the manual so that the user can readily prepare programs for any worship occasion. A glance at the General Index at the front of the book will reveal the overall layout of the manual. The remaining indices are located at the back of the book. There the musician-liturgist will find listings on easy-to-read charts of the proper responsorial psalms and antiphons for all Sundays of the ABC Years, Solemnities, Feasts, Propers of the Saints, etc., with suggested hymns that reflect the theme of each liturgy. Other lists include titles of hymns, tunes, meters, composers, arrangers, authors, music, and text sources.

APPRECIATION

A word of thanks is hereby expressed to those who contributed support and practical assistance over the past ten years to the organization and preparation of this manual. This list is a long one and many will thus remain anonymous because they participated anonymously in the singing of the congregation with whom the music included in this book was first tried, "as silver is tried by fire!" Without them experimentation with new materials could not have been made nor a synthesis such as this one achieved. We thank them for their patience and support.

But there were individuals whose names ought to be mentioned, persons who brought inspiration and encouragement over a score of years without whom, like the anonymous members of the congregation, neither beginnings could have been made nor the termination of the project realized.

First, there was Edith Alice Marier, whose unabating loving support as wife and choir-mother, gave great and continuing daily impetus to the project until her untimely death in June, 1977; Rev. Joseph I. Collins, Pastor-Emeritus of St. Paul's, whose joy of song and enthusiasm for the sung liturgy provided a spiritual and practical matrix from which the Choir School was formed and thus, too, this manual. With competence and firm dedication to the task, there were others to whom a debt of gratitude is here warmly expressed. John Dunn, for example, whose keen eye for liturgical and musical detail helped to keep the work on course over the entire period of preparation. His assiduous investigation of classical and contemporary hymnody gave the hymn section of the book considerable variety and scope as well as providing suitable or proper selections for all Sundays, Solemnities and Feasts given in the Lectionary. In addition to the numerous original texts and psalm paraphrases he contributed, he is primarily responsible for the alteration of many of the hymn texts in order to make their language more sympathetic to current theological thinking and more comfortable to sing. He, moreover contributed encyclopedic charts of psalms and hymns as they relate to the themes given in the Lectionary.

Our thanks for his hard work, insights and concern. To David Goodine, Sr., and David Goodine, Jr., for their unyielding supervision of production logistics and proof-reading, with strong assists from Elizabeth Stouffer and Martin Stankard. Over the last decade various details of preparation also fell into the competent and willing hands of Rev. Joseph Fratic, Joseph Policelli, Edward and Charlene Haugh, Mary Geiger, Rita Waldron, and Louis Faiola. To them we extend our gratitude for their dedication to this project and their cooperation in its realization.





Rite of Blessing and Sprinkling Holy Water

This Rite of Blessing and Sprinkling with Holy Water may replace the Penitential Rite at the beginning of Sunday Masses in churches and chapels.

The Celebrant makes the sign of the cross and greets the people as in No. 1, Page 1. A vessel containing the water to be blessed is placed before him. Facing the people, he invites them to pray, whanting the following:







After a brief silence, he joins his hands and continues with either A or B below

A Outside the Easter Season

God our Father, your gift of water brings life and freshness to the earth; it washes away our sins and brings us eternal life. We ask you now to bless this water, and to give us your protection on this day which you have made your own. Renew the living spring of your life within us and protect us in spirit and body, that we may be free from sin and come into your presence to receive your gift of salvation. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

B During the Easter Season



Lord God almighty, hear the prayers of your people: we celebrate our creation and redemption. Hear our prayers and bless this water which gives fruitfulness to the fields, and refreshment and cleansing to man. You chose water to show your goodness when you led your people to freedom through the Red Sea and satisfied their thirst in the desert with water from the rock. Water was the symbol used by the prophets to foretell your new covenant with man. You made the water of baptism holy by Christ's baptism in the Jordan: by it you give us new birth and renew us in holiness. May this water remind us of our baptism, and let us share the joy of all who have been baptized at Easter. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

When salt is mixed with the water, the Celebrant blesses the salt, chanting as above



Almighty God, we ask you to bless this salt as once you blessed the salt scattered over the water by the prophet Elisha. Wherever this salt and water are sprinkled, drive away the power of evil, and protect us always by the presence of your Holy Spirit. Grant this through Christ our Lord.

Then he pours the salt into the water in silence. Taking the sprinkler, the Celebrant sprinkles hhimself and his ministers, then the rest of the clergy and the people. He may move through the church for the sprinkling of the people.

The Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ According to Matthew

Narrator The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. One of the Twelve whose name was Judas Iscariot went off to the chief priests and said,

Speaker "What are you willing to give me if I hand Jesus over to you?"

They paid him thirty pieces of silver, and from that time on he kept looking for an opportunity to hand him over. On the first day of the feast of Unleavened Bread, the disciples came to Jesus and said,



N. He said,

Jesus "Go to this man in the city and tell him, 'The Teacher says, My appointed time draws near. I am to celebrate the Passover with my disciples in your house'."

The disciples then did as Jesus had ordered and prepared the Passover Supper. When it grew dark he reclined at table with the Twelve. In the course of the meal, he said,

"I give you my word, one of you is about to betray me."

Distressed at this, they began to say to him one after another,



N. He replied,

N.

- J. "The man who has dipped his hand into the dish with me is the one who will hand me over. The Son of Man is departing, as Scripture says of him, but woe to that man by whom the Son of Man is betrayed. Better for him if he had never been born."
- N. Then Judas, his betrayer, spoke:
- S. "Surely it is not I, Rabbi?"
- N. Jesus answered,

- J. "It is you who have said it."
- N. During the meal Jesus took bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying:
- J. "Take this and eat it. This is my body."
- N. Then he took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying:
- J. "All of you must drink from it, for this is my blood, the blood of the covenant, to be poured out in behalf of many for the forgiveness of sins. I tell you, I will not drink this fruit of the vine from now until the day I drink new wine with you in my Father's reign."
- N. Then, after singing songs of praise, they walked out to the Mount of Olives. Jesus then said to them,
- J. "Tonight your faith in me will be shaken, for Scripture has it: 'I will strike the shepherd and the sheep of the flock will be dispersed.' But after I am raised up, I will go to Galilee ahead of you."
- N. Peter responded,
- S. "Though all may have their faith in you shaken, mine will never be shaken!"
- N. Jesus said to him,
- J. "I give you my word, before the cock crows tonight you will deny me three times."
- N. Peter replied,
- S. "Even though I have to die with you, I will never disown you."
- N. And all the other disciples said the same. Then Jesus went with them to a place called Gethsemane. He said to his disciples,
- J. "Stay here while I go over there and pray."
- N. He took along Peter and Zebedee's two sons, and began to experience sorrow and distress. Then he said to them,
- J. "My heart is nearly broken with sorrow. Remain here and stay awake with me."
- N. He advanced a little and fell prostrate in prayer.
- J. "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass by me. Still, let it be as you would have it, not as I."
- N. When he returned to his disciples, he found them asleep. He said to Peter,

- J. "So you could not stay awake with me for even an hour? Be on guard and pray that you may not undergo trial. The spirit is willing, but nature is weak."
- N. Withdrawing a second time, he began to pray:
- J. "My Father, if this cannot pass me by without my drinking it, your will be done!"
- Once more, on his return, he found them asleep; they could not keep their eyes open. He left them again, withdrew somewhat, and began to pray a third time, saying the same words as before. Finally he returned to his disciples and said to them,
- J. "Sleep on now. Enjoy your rest! The hour is on us when the Son of Man is to be handed over to the power of evil men. Get up! Let us be on our way! See, my betrayer is here."
 - While he was still speaking, Judas, one of the Twelve, arrived accompanied by a great crowd with swords and clubs. They had been sent by the chief priests and elders of the people. His betrayer had arranged to give them a signal, saying,
 - "The man I shall embrace is the one; take hold of him."
- N. He immediately went over to Jesus, embraced him and said:
 - "Peace, Rabbi!"

- Jesus answered,
- "Do what you are here for, Friend!"
- N. At that moment they stepped forward to lay hands on Jesus and arrested him. Suddenly one of those who accompanied Jesus put his hand to his sword, drew it, and slashed at the high priest's servant, cutting off his ear. Jesus said to him:
 - "Put back your sword where it belongs. Those who use the sword are sooner or later destroyed by it. Do you not suppose that I can call on my Father to provide at a moment's notice more than twelve legions of angels? But then how would the Scriptures be fulfilled which say it must happen this way?"
 - At that very time Jesus said to the crowd:
 - "Am I a brigand, that you have come armed with swords and clubs to arrest me? From day to day I sat teaching in the temple precincts, yet you never arrested me. Nonetheless, all this has happened in fulfillment of the writings of the prophets."

N. Then all the disciples deserted him and fled. Those who had apprehended Jesus led him off to Caiaphas the high priest, where the scribes and the elders were convened. Peter kept following him at a distance as far as the high priest's residence. Going inside, he sat down with the guards to see the outcome. The chief priests, with the whole Sanhedrin, were busy trying to obtain false testimony against Jesus so that they might put him to death. They discovered none, despite the many false witnesses who took the stand. Finally, two came forward who stated:






- N. The high priest rose to his feet and addressed him:

V. That is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" This made some of the bystanders who heard it remark,




- V. Immediately one of them ran off and got a sponge. He soaked it in cheap wine, and sticking it on a reed, tried to make him drink.




When Jesus was in Bethany reclining at table in the house of Simon the leper, a woman entered carrying an alabaster jar of perfume made from expensive aromatic nard. Breaking the jar, she began to pour the perfume on his head. Some were saying to themselves indignantly:



They were infuriated at her. But Jesus said:

"Let her alone. Why do you criticize her? She has done me a kindness. The poor you will always have with you and you can be generous with them whenever you wish, but you will not always have me. She has done what she could. By perfuming my body she is anticipating its preparation for burial. I assure you, wherever the good news is proclaimed throughout the world, what she has done will be told in her memory."

Then Judas Iscariot, one of the Twelve, went off to the chief priests to hand Jesus over to them. Hearing what he had to say, they were jubilant and promised to give him money. These women had followed Jesus when he was in Galilee and attended to his needs. There were also many others who had come up with him to Jerusalem. As they led him away, they laid hold of one Simon the Cyrenean, who was coming in from the fields. They put a crossbeam on Simon's shoulder for him to carry along behind Jesus. A great crowd of people followed him, including women who beat their breasts and lamented over him. Jesus turned to them and said:
- J. "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me. Weep for yourselves and for your children. The days are coming when they will say, 'Happy are the sterile, the wombs that never bore and the breasts that never nursed.' Then they will begin saying to the mountains, 'Fall on us,' and to the hills 'Cover us.' If they do these things in the green wood, what will happen in the dry?"
- N. Two others who were criminals were led along with him to be crucified. When they came to Skull Place, as it was called, they crucified him there and the criminals as well, one on his right and the other on his left. Jesus said,
- J. "Father, forgive them; they do not know what they are doing."
- N. They divided his garments, rolling dice for them. The people stood there watching and the leaders kept jeering at him saying,



The soldiers also made fun of him, coming forward to offer him their sour wine and saying:



- N. There was an inscription over his head: "This is the King of the Jews." One of the criminals hanging in crucifixion blasphemed him,
 - "Aren't you the Messiah? Then save yourself and us."
 - But the other one rebuked him:
 - "Have you no fear of God, seeing you are under the same sentence? We deserve it, after all.

 We are only paying the price for what we've done, but this man has done nothing wrong."
- N. Then he said,

- "Jesus, remember me when you enter upon your reign."
- N. And Jesus replied,
 - "I assure you: this day you will be with me in paradise."
- N. It was now around midday, and darkness came over the whole land until midafternoon with an eclipse of the sun. The curtain in the sanctuary was torn in two. Jesus uttered a loud cry and said,
- J. "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit."
- N. After he said this, he expired.

(Kneel and pause.)

- N. The centurion, upon seeing what had happened, gave glory to God by saying,
- S. "Surely, this was an innocent man."
- N. After the crowd assembled for this spectacle witnessed what had happened, they went home, beating their breasts. All his friends and the women who had accompanied him from Galilee were standing at a distance watching everything.* There was a man named Joseph', an upright and holy member of the Sanhedrin, who had not been associated with their plan or their action. He was from Arimathea, a Jewish town, and he looked expectantly for the reign of God. This man approached Pilate with a request for Jesus' body. He took it down, wrapped it in fine linen, and laid it in a tomb hewn out of the rock, in which no one had yet been buried. That was the Day of Preparation, and the sabbath was about to begin. The women who had come with him from Galilee followed along. They saw the tomb and how his body was buried. Then they went back home to prepare spices and perfumes. They observed the sabbath as a day of rest, in accordance with the law.



The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

Jesus went out with his disciples across the Kidron valley. There was a garden there, and he and his disciples entered it. The place was familiar to Judas as well, the one who was to hand him over, because Jesus had often met there with his disciples. Judas took the cohort as well as guards supplied by the chief priests and the Pharisees, and came there with lanterns, torches and weapons. Jesus, aware of all that would happen to him, stepped forward and said to them,

"Who is it you want?"

They replied,



He answered.

"I am he."

Now Judas, the one who was to hand him over, was right there with them. As Jesus said to them, "I am he," they retreated slightly and fell to the ground. Jesus put the question to them again,

"Who is it you want?"

They repeated,



Jesus said,

"I have told you, I am he. If I am the one you want, let these men go."

This was to fulfill what he had said, "I have not lost one of those you gave me." Then Simon Peter, who had a sword, drew it and struck the slave of the high priest, severing his right ear. The slave's name was Malchus. At that Jesus said to Peter,

"Put your sword back in its sheath. Am I not to drink the cup the Father has given me?"

Then the soldiers of the cohort, their tribune, and the Jewish guards arrested Jesus and bound him. They led him first to Annas, the father-in-law of Caiaphas who was high priest that year. It was Caiaphas who had proposed to the Jews the advantage of having one man die for the people. Simon Peter, in company with another disciple,

kept following Jesus closely. This disciple, who was known to the high priest, stayed with Jesus as far as the high priest's courtyard, while Peter was left standing at the gate. The disciple known to the high priest came out and spoke to the woman at the gate, and then brought Peter in. This servant girl who kept the gate said to Peter,

Speaker "Aren't you one of this man's followers?"

- N. He replied,
- S. "No, not I."
- N. Now the night was cold, and the servants and the guards who were standing around had made a charcoal fire to warm themselves by. Peter joined them and stood there warming himself. The high priest questioned Jesus, first about his disciples, then about his teaching. Jesus answered by saying:
- J. "I have spoken publicly to any who would listen. I always taught in a synagogue or in the temple area where all the Jews come together. There was nothing secret about anything I said. Why do you question me? Question those who heard me when I spoke. It should be obvious they will know what I said."
- N. At this reply, one of the guards who was standing nearby gave Jesus a sharp blow on the face. He said,
- S. "Is that any way to answer the high priest?"
- N. Jesus replied,
- J. "If I said anything wrong produce the evidence, but if I spoke the truth why hit me?"
- N. Annas next sent him, bound, to the high priest Caiaphas. All through this, Simon Peter had been standing there warming himself. They said to him,




- N. He denied it, saying:
- S. "I am not!"
- N. One of the high priest's slaves as it happened, a relative of the man whose ear Peter had severed insisted,
- S. "But did I not see you with him in the garden?"
- N. Peter denied it again. At that moment a cock began to crow. At daybreak they brought

Jesus from Caiaphas to the praetorium. They did not enter the praetorium themselves, for they had to avoid ritual impurity if they were to eat the Passover supper. Pilate came out to them. He demanded,

- S. "What accusation do you bring against this man?"

- S. "Why do you not take him and pass judgment on him according to your law?"

- N. This was to fulfill what Jesus had said, indicating the sort of death he would die. Pilate went back into the praetorium and summoned Jesus. He asked him,

At this Pilate said to him,

 - "Are you saying this on your own, or have others been telling you about me?"
- N. Pilate retorted,
- S. "I am no Jew! It is your own people and the chief priests who have handed you over to me. What have you done?"



N. Barabbas was an insurrectionist. Pilate's next move was to take Jesus and have him scourged. The soldiers then wove a crown of thorns and fixed it on his head, throwing around his shoulders a cloak of royal purple. Repeatedly they came up to him and said, slapping his face as they did so,




- N. Pilate went out a second time and said to the crowd:
- S. "Observe what I do. I am going to bring him out to you to make you realize that I find no case against him."
- N. When Jesus came out wearing the crown of thorns and the purple cloak, Pilate said to them,
- S. "Look at the man!"
- N. As soon as the chief priests and the temple guards saw him, they shouted.



- N. Pilate said,
- S. "Take him and crucify him yourselves; I find no case against him."

The Jews responded,



- When Pilate heard this kind of talk, he was more afraid than ever. Going back into the praetorium, he said to Jesus,
- S. "Where do you come from?"
 - Jesus would not give him any answer. Pilate asked him,
 - "Do you refuse to speak to me? Do you not know that I have the power to release you and the power to crucify you?"



- After this, Pilate was eager to release him, but the Jews shouted,






- Pilate heard what they were saying, then brought Jesus outside and took a seat on a judge's bench at the place called the Stone Pavement-Gabbatha in Hebrew. It was the Preparation Day for Passover, and the hour was about noon. He said to the Jews,
- "Look at your king!"



N. In the end, Pilate handed Jesus over to be crucified. Jesus was led away, and carrying the cross by himself, went out to what is called the Place of the Skull (in Hebrew, Golgotha). There they crucified him, and two others with him: one on either side, Jesus in the middle. Pilate had an inscription placed on the cross which read, "Jesus the Nazorean, the King of the Jews." This inscription in Hebrew, Latin and Greek, was read by many of the Jews, since the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city. The chief priests of the Jews tried to tell Pilate,



- N. Pilate answered.
- S "What I have written, I have written."
- N. After the soldiers had crucified Jesus, they took his garments and divided them four ways, one for each soldier. There was also his tunic, but this tunic was woven in one piece from top to bottom and had no seam. They said to each other,

N. The purpose of this was to have the Scripture fulfilled: "They divided my garments among them; for my clothing they cast lots." And this was what the soldiers did. Near the cross of Jesus there stood his mother, his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. Seeing his mother there with the disciple whom he loved, Jesus said to his mother,

- "Woman, there is your son."
- V. In turn he said to the disciple,
 - "There is your mother."
 - From that hour onward, the disciple took her into his care. After that, Jesus, realizing that everything was now finished, to bring the Scripture to fulfillment, said,
 - "I am thirsty."

- There was a jar there, full of common wine. They stuck a sponge soaked in this wine on some hyssop, and raised it to his lips. When Jesus took the wine, he said,
 - "Now it is finished."
- Then he bowed his head, and delivered over his spirit.

(Kneel and pause)

Since it was the Preparation Day the Jews did not want to have the bodies left on the cross during the sabbath, for that sabbath was a solemn feast day. They asked Pilate that the legs be broken and the bodies be taken away. Accordingly, the soldiers came and broke the legs of the men crucified with Jesus, first of one, then of the other. When they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs. One of the soldiers ran a lance into his side, and immediately blood and water flowed out. This testimony has been given by an eyewitness, and his testimony is true. He tells what he knows is true, so that you may believe. These events took place for the fulfillment of Scripture: "Break none of his bones." There is still another Scripture passage which says: "They shall look on him whom they have pierced."

Afterward, Joseph of Arimathea, a disciple of Jesus, although a secret one for fear of the Jews, asked Pilate's permission to remove Jesus' body. Pilate granted it, so they came and took the body away. Nicodemus, the man who had first come to Jesus at night, likewise came, bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes which weighed about a hundred pounds. They took Jesus' body, and in accordance with Jewish burial custom, bound it up in wrappings of cloth with perfumed oils. In the place where he had been crucified there was a garden, and in the garden a new tomb in which no one had ever been laid. Because of the Jewish Preparation Day they laid Jesus there, for the tomb was close at hand.

All respond Amen. Celebrant sprinkles the surplices, crosses and hymnals

with holy water

B. Presentation of choristers

Choirmaster Reverend Father, we ask that you invest and bless these choristers here present (announces all names) as members of the (name of choir). They have shown such zeal for the service of Christ that they have proved themselves worthy of this honor. Celebrant God be praised. Bring the choristers forward.

Choristers form in rows in the sanctuary

C. Celebrant My dear choristers, do you promise to serve Christ, our King, by attending faithfully and punctually all classes, rehearsals and services required of you, as long as you remain choristers in good standing in the (name of choir)?

Choristers Yes, with the grace of God, I will.

Celebrant Will you respect and obey those who are set over you and keep all the rules of the choir?

Choristers Yes, with the grace of God, I will.

Celebrant Let us pray. Extends his hands over the choristers and continues. O Lord, God almighty, behold and sanctify these your servants. Keep them in the holy fellowship of your saints through the mercy and loving kindness of your only begotten Son, Jesus Christ, who lives in unity with the Holy Spirit, and reigns as King forever.

All respond Amen.

Choristers come one by one to the celebrant. Each kneels before him, places his right hand in that of the celebrant, and says:

Chorister I consecrate my voice to God, to sing his praises and to proclaim his glory; and I promise to keep my heart and tongue pure so that I may always praise him more worthily.

Celebrant then invests each chorister with surplice and cross saying to each:

(Name. .), receive this surplice. Wear it with love and reverence before the altar of God that you may be found worthy to be numbered among the choirs of angels and saints. Chorister Amen.

Celebrant continues Receive this cross. Whenever you place it about your neck, keep in mind that it is the sign of your salvation and final victory. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Chorister Amen.

Celebrant continues Receive this book. May the inspired songs found in its pages help you to lift your heart and mind to God when you sing your praises to him. Chorister Amen.

After the last chorister has been invested, the choristers stand and sing REPLEATUR OS MEUM as given on the next page. All respond Amen.

Celebrant blesses the choristers, making the sign of the cross over them saying:

May God bless you and may he be the keeper of your hearts and minds, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

All Amen.

Celebrant then sprinkles the choristers with holy water. They process to the choir stalls singing:





Response to God's Gifts

James 1: 22 - 27.

But he who has looked carefully into the perfect law of liberty and has remained in it,
