

THE LITURGY: WORSHIP: THE REALIZATION OF THE MYSTERY OF CHRIST

The Mystery of Christ

The word "mystery" comes from a Greek verb which means to keep one's eyes or ears closed. Ancients used the word to describe the secret symbols of their "mystery religions," secrets which were explained to new members only at the time of initiation. Early Christian writers found the term useful to express truths to be believed though they cannot be fully understood. These become acceptable by the explanation, by the illumination of faith. All of us are familiar with the expressions "the Mystery of the Incarnation," "the Mystery of the Trinity." The same word is used to describe the presence of Christ in Salvation History. It describes the constant saving presence of the Lord among us after the Ascension and Pentecost events. He is found in the sacraments: under their signs (mysteries). Christ continues his Incarnation, Death, Resurrection and Ascension. He extends redemption through space and time. He meets anyone who wants to encounter him under the "significant signs" (mysteries) of the sacraments. The meaningful matter, words and gesture of each sacrament signify not only the Lord's presence, but his specific purpose in coming. As in all "mystical" experiences, the gift of faith is essential to the realization of the sacrament. Only through his faith can the Christian understand and accept the Lord's presence and purpose in the signs, the sacramental mysteries: words, water, washing, bread and wine, eating and nourishing. Through understanding and faith, the Christian finds Christ in the sacramental mysteries.

About the time that the aged empire of Constantine yielded to the youthful thrust of Charlemagne, Christian theology and

worship underwent a change too. The <u>mystical</u> Christ seemed to become the <u>mysterious</u> Christ. The signs of the sacraments began to be seen as veils rather than as meaningful symbols. Even the language of worship (in our case, Latin) came to be understood as a means of concealment rather than of communication. As late as 1661, Pope Alexander VII wrote to the bishops of France about a recently published translation of the Latin missal into French:

"We have learned with great sorrow that in the kingdom of France certain sons of perdition, itching with novelties detrimental to souls, and despising the laws and practice of the church, have lately come to such madness as to dare to translate the Roman Missal into French and to hand it over to persons of every rank and sex. Thus they have attempted by their rash action to degrade the most sacred rites, to lower the majesty which the Latin language gives to them, and to expose the divine mysteries to the common gaze . . ."

And only with difficulty did the second Vatican Council restore the possibility of a vernacular worship in our own days.

"Liturgy" derives from the Greek noun which means "act of the people." The term, "laity" comes from the same root. Even in this common derivation is the importance of the laity in the liturgy stressed. "Worship" is the (old) English equivalent to the word liturgy. Both mean the service to God given by his people. By it are expressed adoration, thanksgiving, petition and sorrow, through the Lord Redeemer. At the same time liturgy proclaims God's coming to us in response to our service to endow us with grace, through the same Lord Redeemer. Liturgy has an upward and downward movement; "Glory to God, Peace (Grace) to men . . ." (Luke 1). Since the mystery of Christ as it is realized in the sacraments is the Lord's "usual" way of bringing, extending and restoring the gift of salvation, the close relationship between liturgy and sacrament stands out. For example, this is true even in Baptism. It would seem that the newly baptized receives everything from the Lord, that there is only a downward movement, yet God is also worshipped. He gains a new worshipper.

The present liturgical updating is a response to the worshipping Christian's reasonable and urgent demand that he know what is happening. He wants to understand by hearing what he is saying to God and what God is saying to him. We have come a long way since the time of Alexander VII. In all of the current reform, the Church does not intend to restore the ancient simply because it is ancient. Wisely, she is building the new liturgy through a thorough understanding of the history of the old. The Church is not a museum; she is a living organism ever being renewed to keep young.

The Use of the Hymnal-Missa!

This book has been developed and written to give to the worshipper a good understanding of and a way to share in the liturgy, in word and song. We print nothing that the worshipper can and should listen to, in the service. We omit whatever the commentator, reader, or celebrant says aloud in English. An assembly shows its oneness by "wrapping" its ears around the voice of one minister. We can easily miss the essentially community nature of the church if each pays attention only to his own book. Here is the one great weakness in the use of the missal. This type of book distracted the worshipper from the assembly. A companion volume will give the text of all readings, together with commentaries in depth. What follows, then, is a brief summary.

The Church Year

Long before God assembled and communicated himself to the nation of Israel, his primitive children were awed by the seasons of the year. Christian liturgy derives its yearly cycle from Israel, and Israel found some of its annual celebrations in worship practices of pagan ancestors. Whether primitive or sophisticated, man is still impressed by weather, the movement of the sun and moon, by seasons hot and cold. These cosmic forces he cannot control. Therefore he respects and either worships them or makes them the basis of his worship. Christianity converts the cycle of the year into the renewal of the cycle of redemption, the review of the History of Sal-

vation. The beginning of the liturgical year, Advent, suggests a four-fold "coming" of Christ. He came first in Prophecy, in the Old Testament, to make ready for his coming into our nature and time. Prophecy was fulfilled when the Word, the Second Person of God, became man and lived in our time. This is his Coming in History.

He was born, lived, taught, died and arose. In the Ascensionevent, he simply and gloriously returned to his proper dimension and position as the Son of God, the Redeemer, He brought into the glorious kingdom not only his divine nature but our human nature too. Thereby he promised us our own share in his glory. This sharing begins at Baptism, is expanded in Christian living, and realizes its fulfillment after death. Christ died and arose again simply to prove to us that we shall do the same. Therefore the Lord continues to come to us individually in our space and time under the signs of the sacraments. This is his Coming in Mystery; the Mystery of Christ. In Baptism we die with Christ to sin, and arise in a new life as St. Paul has assured us. Therefore, the baptismal pool is the tomb in which we are buried with Christ; it is the womb from which we arise as new creatures. The other sacraments were fashioned by the Lord to help us to meet the crises of Christian life. In them we encounter Christ personally so that he can strengthen, ordain, heal, and nourish us unto our duties as Christians, other Christs here below.

The Word of God came in prophecy to prepare for his becoming man in history. He continues to come to us in mystery, under the signs of the sacraments, so that we can make ourselves and the whole world ready for his second visible coming, which is called the Parousia. This word was used by the ancient Greeks to describe the appearance, the coming, of the glorious emperor. Christians chose the word to describe the final coming of the King to claim us and the whole universe as the kingdom which he redeemed and consecrated unto the glory and honor of his Father; his Coming in Majesty.

We have then, four comings of the Lord: in prophecy, in history, in mystery, and in majesty. The liturgy of the church year

recalls this four-fold advent of Christ. In the season of Advent, we study the prophets of the old testament. We read again how they, in wonderful and various ways, foretold the birth of the Saviour.

In the <u>Christmas-Epiphany</u> season, we recall the historical event of the birth of the Saviour and of his being shown forth (Epiphany) as the glorious Son of God. In <u>Lent</u> and <u>Eastertide</u>, and this includes Pentecost, we not only recall the very history of our salvation, we relive it. At Christmas we just remember that Christ was born a man. In the Easter "mystery" we actually <u>relive</u> Christ's dying and arising again and our being one with him in these saving events, through Baptism and the Eucharist. In Pentecost we relive the coming of the Holy Spirit into the church to ennoble and enliven us unto our apostolic work. Easter is the renewal of Baptism; Pentecost revives Confirmation.

In the time after Pentecost, on the ordinary Sundays of the year, we are taught how to live as children of God, as brothers and sisters of the Lord.

The Eucharist and the Other Sacraments

All sacraments are related to the eucharistic celebration; all of them are public celebrations of the assembly of the church, of God's holy people. In chapter 19 of the book of Exodus, the Lord told Moses that the children of Israel were his holy people, a royal priesthood. St. Peter tells all of us Christians that we are also a priestly and royal family (1 PT. 2:9-10).

Baptism and Confirmation empower and charge us to take part in the Eucharist, the great act of thanksgiving and worship, as members of God's holy, priestly people. We are accepted and given status in the assembly of worship.

In Penance, the priest represents Christ <u>and</u> the assembly to reconcile the sinner, to admit him anew to the community, so that he can share at the table of the Lord. The sinner may be actually forgiven by an Act of Contrition, but he should await the Sacrament of Penance before he returns to Communion.

Holy Orders consecrate the men who are to preside in the assembly. The priest is needed to set up the altar of sacrifice, the banquet table of Holy Communion in the midst of his brethren and to form them into a eucharistic (thanksgiving) community.

Matrimony consecrates a man and a woman into the "two-inoneness" of Christ and his Church. Their lives together and communion with each other are a constant and real image of the eucharistic assembly.

The anointing of the sick consecrates together into one, the suffering of the Christian and the suffering of Christ. It underscores a oneness in suffering which the Christian realizes mystically (under signs) with his brothers and with the Lord in every eucharistic assembly (Mass). The anointing joins the Christian's suffering to all of the Masses that he has celebrated. In the words of Paul, he makes up in his own body that which is lasting to the suffering of Christ (COL. 1:24). In the Mass, Christ no longer suffers. It is up to us to make up for his lack of suffering by our own. Anointing achieves this joining and consecration.

INTRODUCTION TO THE PROPER SECTION

This section of the book gives the user all the material which he needs to participate fully in the celebration of the Eucharistic Liturgy. The proper chants are printed in full so that they can be chanted or recited. The readings are not given because the community should listen to the official proclamation of the message by the celebrant or reader. However, a helpful but short commentary on the theme and reading of each celebration is given. The choice of a theme is often arbitrary since many celebrations just do not have a central idea. Whereas some of the readings were deliberately combined to develop a theme, other arrangements of Epistles and Gospels have been so shuffled through the centuries that there is little natural relationship between them. The commentary given here is a possible way of interpreting the readings around one point of meditation and instruction.

FIRST SUNDAY IN ADVENT

EMBER WEDNESDAY IN ADVENT

All peoples are impressed by the phenomena of nature. The ancient pagans marked the change of the seasons by sacrifice and celebration. Early Christianity took this sort of observance into her own liturgy. We have four sets of Ember days to mark the change of seasons. LENT

In early Christian times, Lent was the time for final preparation of converts to be baptized at Easter. Later it became time for public penance for serious sinners. They were reconciled to the Church during the Lenten disciplines. Finally Lent became a review of learning and a repentence from sinning for all Christian people. If we understand these three elements we understand the meaning of this time.

ASH WEDNESDAY

This celebration considers the "second baptism" of Christian sinners; the ashes of penance renew baptismal holiness.

Repeat Antiphon.

MEDITATION SONG

PS. 95. 8-9: PS. 28. 9

Bring gifts and enter his courts; worship the Lord in his holy court. The Lord strips the forests, and in his temple all say, "Glory!"

SECOND READING

SONG WHILE PREPARING THE GIFTS

PS. 136, 1

By the streams of Babylon we sat and wept when we remembered Sion.

COMMUNION SONG

PS. 118, 49-50

Remember your word to your servant, O Lord, since you have given me hope. This is my comfort in my affliction.

FIRST FRIDAY IN PASSIONTIDE

Here we have the necessary blasphemy of God's being condemned to death by a creature, according to his plan of love.

ENTRANCE SONG

PS. 30, 10, 16, 18, 2

Antiphon: Have pity on me, O Lord, for I am in distress; rescue me from the clutches of my enemies and my persecutors. O Lord, let me not be put to shame, for I call upon you.

Psalm: In you, O Lord, I take refuge; let me never be put to shame.
In your justice rescue me. Repeat Antiphon.

FIRST READING

JER. 17,13-18

MEDITATION SONG PS. 34, 20, 22; PS. 102, 10; PS. 78, 8-9

My enemies spoke peaceably to me: and in anger they afflicted me.

FIRST SATURDAY IN PASSIONTIDE

Again the cross emerges as the sign of Christ's victory and of our Redemption, our sharing his victory with him.

Antiphon: Have pity on me, O Lord, for I am in distress; rescue me from the clutches of my enemies and my persecutors.

O Lord, let me not be put to shame, for I call upon you.

Psalm: In you, O Lord, I take refuge; let me never be put to shame. In your justice rescue me.

Repeat Antiphon.

FIRST READING

MEDITATION SONG

Ps. 34, 20, 22

THE SECOND SUNDAY IN PASSIONTIDE (PALM SUNDAY)

The full observance of this Lord's day gives depth to the Mystery of Redemption. This depth is realized when we consider Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem much less a victory than was his death on the cross. The first part of the rite, the palm procession, underscores the true meaning of Matthew's Passion which is read in the Mass itself.

The Solemn Procession of Palms BLESSING OF THE PALMS

As the procession of ministers and servers enters the church. this antiphon is said or sung.

Antiphon: Hosanna to the Son of David!

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

O king of Israel:

hosanna in the highest.

The celebrant with hands joined blesses the palms:

Priest: The Lord be with you. People: And with your spirit.

Prayer

Priest: Through Christ our Lord.

People: Amen.

The celebrant sprinkles the palms and then incenses them. The palm is then distributed, while the following antiphons and psalms are said or sung.

Antiphon I: The children of the Hebrews. PS. 23, 1-2, 7-10

bearing olive branches,

went to meet the Lord, crying aloud and saying.

"Hosanna in the highest."

Psalm: The Lord's are the earth and its fullness; the world and those who dwell in it. For He founded it upon the seas and established it upon the rivers.

Repeat Antiphon.

Lift up, O gates, your lintels; reach up, you ancient portals, that the king of glory may come in. "Who is this king of glory?" "The Lord, strong and mighty. Repeat Antiphon. the Lord, mighty in battle."

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. As it was in the beginning. is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

Repeat Antiphon.

Antiphon II: The Hebrew children spread their garments in the way. and shouted saving. "Hosanna to the Son of David: blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord." Psalm: All you peoples, clap your hands, shout to God with cries of gladness For the Lord, the Most High, the awesome, is the great king over all the earth. Repeat Antiphon.

He brings peoples under us: nations under our feet. He chooses for us our inheritance. the glory of Jacob whom he loves.

Repeat Antiphon.

PS. 46

God mounts his throne amid shouts of joy; the Lord, amid trumpet blasts. Sing praise to God, sing praise; sing praise to our king, sing praise.

Repeat Antiphon.

For king of all the earth is God: sing hymns of praise. God reigns over the nations. God sits upon his holy throne.

Repeat Antiphon.

The princes of the people are gathered together with the people of the God of Abraham. For God's are the guardians of the earth; he is supreme.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

Repeat Antiphon.

The deacon or the celebrant then reads from the holy Gospel according to St. Matthew.

After the celebrant has put incense into the thurible, the procession is formed. Then the deacon sings:



THE PROCESSION WITH BLESSED PALMS

During the beginning of the procession, any or all of the following antiphons can be said or sung:

Antiphon I: With flowers and palms the multitudes run to meet the redeemer, and they give becoming honors to the triumphant victor; the nations utter the praises of the Son of God, and their voices thunder through the clouds in praise of Christ: "Hosanna."

Antiphon II: With the angels and the children, let us be found faithful, acclaiming him who triumphs over death, "Hosanna in the highest."

Antiphon III: The great crowd gathered for the feast day acclaimed the Lord:

"Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord: Hosanna in the highest."

Antiphon IV: The whole company of those descending LK.19,37,38 began to rejoice and to praise God with a loud voice for all the miracles that they had seen, saying, "Blessed is he who comes as king, in the name of the Lord!

During the procession the following hymn is sung by the choir and people alternately, the people singing the refrain.

Choir: All glory, laud, and honor to thee, Redeemer King! To whom the lips of children Made sweet Hosannas ring. People: All Glory, etc.

Peace on earth, and glory in the highest!"

Choir: 1. Thou art the King of Israel,
thou David's royal Son,
who in the Lord's Name comest,
the King and Blessed One. People: All Glory, etc.

Choir: 2. The company of angels

are praising thee on high;

and mortal men, and all things

created.make reply. People: All Glory, etc.

Choir: 3. The people of the Hebrews
with palms before thee went:
our praise and prayers and anthems
before thee we present. People: All Glory, etc.

Choir: 4. To thee before thy passion they sang their hymns of praise: to thee, now high exalted, our melody we raise. People: All Glory, etc.

Choir: 5. Thou didst accept their praises;
accept the prayers we bring,
who in all good delightest,
thou good and gracious King. People: All Glory, etc.

With permission, All Glory, Praise, and Honor, p.79, may be substituted for the above hymn.

As the procession returns to the church, the following is said or sung.

RE-ENTRY INTO THE CHURCH

Antiphon: When the Lord entered the holy city, the children of the Hebrews, foretelling the resurrection of life, Carrying palm branches, cried out, "Hosanna in the highest."
When the populace had heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem, they went out to meet him.
Carrying palm branches; "Hosanna in the highest," they cried.

The celebrant then reads a concluding prayer, which is immediately followed by:

AT MASS

ENTRANCE HYMN

PS. 21, 20, 22, 2

Antiphon: O Lord, be not far from me; O my help, hasten to aid me. Save me from the lion's mouth; from the horns of the wild bulls, my wretched life.

Psalm: My God, my God, look upon me, why have you forsaken me? Far from my salvation are the words of my sins.

Repeat Antiphon.

FIRST READING

PHIL. 2,5-11

MEDITATION SONG PS. 72, 24, 1-3; PS. 21, 2-9, 18, 19, 22, 24, 32

You have hold of my right hand; with your counsel you guide me; in the end you will receive me in glory. How good God is to Israel, to those who are clean of heart! But, as for me, I almost lost my balance; my feet all but slipped, because I was envious of sinners when I saw them prosper though they were wicked.

My God, my God, look upon me: why have you forsaken me? Far from my salvation, are the words of my sins. O my God, I cry out by day and you answer not: by night, and there is no relief. But you are enthroned in the holy place. O glory of Israel! In you our fathers trusted: they trusted and you delivered them. To you they cried, and they escaped: in you they trusted, and they were not put to shame. But I am a worm, not a man: the scorn of men, despised by the people. SECOND MONDAY IN PASSIONTIDE

Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of Holy Week present the image of Christ, the suffering servant of Yahweh.

ENTRANCE SONG

PS. 34, 1-2, 3

Antiphon: Judge, O Lord, those who wrong me; war against those who make war upon me. Take up the shield and buckler, and rise up in my defense, O Lord, the strength of my salvation.

Psalm: Brandish the lance, and block the way in the face of my pursuers; say to my soul, "I am your salvation."

Repeat Antiphon.

FIRST READING

IS. 50. 5-10

MEDITATION SONG

PS. 34, 23, 3; PS. 102, 10; PS. 78, 8-9

Awake, O Lord, and be vigilant in my defense, my God and my Lord. Brandish the lance, and block the way in the face of my pursuers.

O Lord, deal not with us according to our sins, nor requite us according to our iniquities.

O Lord, remember not against us the iniquities of the past; may your compassion quickly come to us, for we are brought very low.

Help us, O God, our savior because of the glory of your name, O Lord; deliver us and pardon our sins for your name's sake.

Antiphon: At the name of Jesus every knee should bend, of those in heaven, on earth and under the earth, for the Lord became obedient unto death, even to death on a cross.

Therefore our Lord Jesus Christ is in the glory of God the Father.

Psalm: O Lord, hear my prayer, and let my cry come to you. Repeat Antiphon.

FIRST READING

IS. 62, 11; IS. 63, 1-7

MEDITATION SONG

PS. 68, 18, 2-3

After the First Reading:

Hide not your face from your servant; in my distress, make haste to answer me. Save me, O God, for the waters threaten my life; I am sunk in the abysmal swamp where there is no foothold.

SECOND READING MEDITATION SONG

IS. 53, 1-12

After the Second Reading:

PS. 101, 2-5, 14

O Lord, hear my prayer, and let my cry come to you. Hide not your face from me; in the day of my distress, incline your ear to me. In the day when I call, answer me speedily.

THE PASSOVER

In the beginning, the Passover of the Lord was celebrated in a simple vigil between Saturday night and Easter Sunday morning. The faithful did not merely commemorate the events of Salvation. They relived them in the Sacraments of Baptism and the Eucharist. As time went on and the number of catechumens grew, the celebration was extended over three days. as it is now. Gradually, Thursday assumed the character of a renewal of the priesthood; the Last Supper, the washing of the feet. The re-enactment serves to remind priests that they are the servants of the servants of God; that all Christians are members of his priesthood. Friday becomes a day of mystic meditation on the Death of Christ. The spiritual fourth gospel Passion is proclaimed, and the assembly receives Holy Communion. The Easter liturgy relives at once the revival of Baptism and the nourishment of the Eucharist. These sacraments help Christians to grasp fully and interiorly the whole meaning of the Death and Resurrection of the Lord.

THE LORD'S SUPPER* (HOLY THURSDAY)

In this celebration we recall by reliving it; the ordering of the Eucharist and Priesthood.

The Solemn Evening Mass

ENTRANCE SONG

GAL. 6, 14; PS. 66, 2

Antiphon: But it behooves us to glory in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ: in whom is our salvation, life, and result

in whom is our salvation, life, and resurrection:

by whom we are saved and delivered.

Psalm: May God have pity on us and bless us; may he let his face shine upon us; and may he have pity on us. Repeat Antiphon.

After the Glory to God in the Highest is intoned, bells are rung and the organ is played. The organ may be played during the Glory to God in the Highest, but should then be silent until the Glory to God in the Highest of the Easter Vigil.

FIRST READING

I COR. 11,20-32

MEDITATION SONG

PHIL. 2, 8-9

Christ became obedient for us unto death, even to death on a cross.

Therefore, God also has exalted him and has given him the name that is above every name.

SECOND READING

JN. 13,1

If the ceremony of the Washing of the Feet is to be performed, it takes place after the homily. See p.51

^{*}In cathedral churches, the bishop celebrates a special Mass to consecrate the Holy Oils for all parishes. Booklets to explain and present this formula are usually provided for those who join their bishop in this "Chrism Mass."

SONG WHILE PREPARING THE GIFTS

The right hand of the Lord has struck with power: the right hand of the Lord has exalted me; I shall not die, but live, and declare the works of the Lord.

During the distribution of communion, any of Psalms 22, 71, 103 or 150 may be said or sung alternately with the Communion Song.

COMMUNION SONG

JN. 13, 12-13, 15

The Lord Jesus, after he had supped with his disciples, washed their feet, and said to them, "Do you know what I, your Lord and Master, have done to you? I have given you an example, that so you also should do."

At the end of the Eucharistic banquet the consecrated particles are taken to another part of the church, to the place of repose, to provide for communions on Good Friday. The altar cloths are removed because in earlier times this was always done at the end of the Eucharist. The table was set before the meal, cleared right afterwards.

The Solemn Procession of Reposition

During the procession the first four verses of Praise We Christs Immortal Body, p.201, are sung. If necessary, they are repeated until the celebrant arrives at the altar of reposition at which time the last two verses are sung.

After the Sacrament is placed in the altar, the ministers genuflect and change vestments. The main altar is then stripped, during which the celebrant reads an antiphon and psalm.

The Washing of the Feet

In an appropriate place the twelve men whose feet are to be washed, are seated. As the celebrant starts the washing, the following antiphons are said or sung. In each instance, only one verse of the psalm is used.

Antiphon I: "A new commandment I give you, that you love one another, as I have loved you," says the Lord.

Psalm: Happy are they whose way is blameless, PS. 118, 1 who walk in the law of the Lord. Repeat Antiphon.

Antiphon II: After the Lord had risen from supper, JN. 13, 4,5, 15 he poured water into a basin, and began to wash the feet of his disciples: to whom he gave this example.

Psalm: Great is the Lord and wholly to be praised PS. 47, 2 in the city of our God, his holy mountain. Repeat Antiphon.

Antiphon III: See Communion Song of the mass.

Psalm: You have favored, O Lord, your land; PS. 84, 2 you have restored the well-being of Jacob. Repeat Antiphon.

Antiphon IV: "Lord, do you wash my feet?"
Jesus answered and said to him,
"If I do not wash your feet,
you shall have no part with me."

Versicle: He came to Simon Peter, and Peter said to him. Repeat Antiphon.

Versicle: "What I do, you know not now;

but you shall know hereafter." Repeat Antiphon.

Antiphon V: "If I, your Lord and master,

have washed your feet, how much more ought you to wash one another's feet?"

Psalm: Hear this, all you peoples; Ps. 48, 2 hearken, all you, who dwell in the world. Repeat Antiphon.

Antiphon VI: "By this shall all men know JN. 13, 35 that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

Versicle: Jesus said to his disciples. Repeat Antiphon.

Antiphon VII: Let these three, faith, hope and charity abide in you; but the greatest of these is charity.

JN. 13, 6-8

JN. 13, 14

Versicle: And now there remain faith, hope, and charity,

these three;

but the greatest of these is charity.

Where Charity and Love Prevail, p.179, may be sung in place of the following hymn with, permission.

Antiphon VIII: Where charity and love are, there is God.

The love of Christ has gathered us together.

Let us rejoice in him and be glad.

Let us fear and love the living God.

And let us love one another with a sincere heart.

Where charity and love are, there is God.

When, therefore, we are assembled together.

Let us take heed, that we be not divided in mind.

Let malicious quarrels and contentions cease.

And let Christ our God dwell among us.

Where charity and love are, there is God.

Let us also with the blessed see.

Your face in glory, O Christ our God.

There to possess immeasurable and happy joy.

After the Washing the celebrant washes his hands and then says The Lord's Prayer, quietly.

Priest: And lead us not into temptation.

People: But deliver us from evil.

Priest: You have commanded your precepts, O Lord.

People: To be observed exactly.

Priest: You have washed the feet of your disciples.

People: Despise not the work of your hands.

Priest: O Lord, hear my prayer.

People: And let my cry come to you.

Priest: The Lord be with you.
People: And with your spirit.
Priest: forever and ever.

People: Amen.

THE FEAST OF THE PASSION AND DEATH OF THE LORD (GOOD FRIDAY)

It took a long time to prove to those who would see and listen that the death of Christ really liberated many people from the slavery of sin. His obedience destroyed the disease of disobedience. His glorious Resurrection came to be understood as more and more people became Christians. These were identified with Christ in his death and victory, and in the sacraments, especially Baptism and the Eucharist. It is fitting that on the day on which we commemorate the death of the Lord, we should receive the pledge of eternal life in the Holy Sacrament of the Eucharist.

The Solemn Afternoon Liturgy

PART ONE: THE READINGS

The celebrant and ministers enter, genuflect, and prostrate themselves. After a period of reverence, the celebrant, standing at the foot of the altar, says a prayer.

Prayer

People: Amen.

FIRST READING

OS. 6,1-6

At the end of the first reading:

HB. 3, 2-3

Responsory: O Lord, I have heard your hearing and was afraid; I have considered your works and trembled. In the midst of two animals you shall be made known; when the years shall draw near. You shall be known;

When the time shall come, you shall be manifested.

When my soul shall be in trouble,

You will remember mercy, even in your wrath.

God will come from Lebanon, and the Holy One

from the shady and thickly covered mountain.

His majesty covered the heavens; and the earth is full of his praise.

Priest: Let us pray.

Priest: Prayer People: Amen.

SECOND READING

EX. 12,1-11

At the end of the second reading:

Responsory: Deliver me, O Lord, from evil men; PS. 139, 2-10, 14

preserve me from violent men.

From those who devise evil in their hearts,

and stir up wars everyday.

They make their tongues sharp as those of serpents;

the venom of asps is under their lips.

Save me, O Lord, from the hands of the wicked;

preserve me from violent men.

Who plan to trip up my feet —

the proud who have hidden a trap for me.

They have spread cords for a net;

by the wayside they have laid snares for me.

I say to the Lord, you are my God;

hearken, O Lord, to my voice of supplication.

O Lord, my Lord, my strength and my salvation;

You are my helmet in the day of battle!

Give me not up from my desire to the wicked:

They have plotted against me.

Do not forsake me

lest at any time they should triumph.

Those who surround me lift up their heads;

may the mischief which they threaten overwhelm them.

There follow a great and solemn prayer of the faithful, the exposition of the holy cross, and the brief communion service.

PART TWO: THE SOLEMN PRAYERS

Here the celebrant sings solemnly prayers which are divided into two parts and are answered:



- 3. For all Clerics and Categories of the Faithful.
- 4. For Governments.
- 5. For Catechumens.
- 6. For the Needs of the Faithful.
- 7. For the Unity of the Church.
- 8. For the Conversion of the Jews.
- 9. For the Conversion of Unbelievers.

PART THREE: THE SOLEMN ADORATION OF THE CROSS

The celebrant and the ministers put aside their outmost vestments and prepare for the adoration. The deacon brings in the cross and the celebrant, singing Behold the Wood, unveils the cross, one section at a time; all take up the chant at Come, let us adore and then kneel. The Behold the Wood is sung three times, each at a higher pitch.

After each invitation, the assembly sings or says "Come, let us Adore."



THE REPROACHES

During the adoration by the people the following chants are said or sung. They should be divided between two groups: choir and people or first choir and second choir. The singing must be concluded with the final verse of the hymn: Blessing, honor everlasting.

My people, what have I done unto you? or in what have I offended you?

Answer me.

Because I led you out of the land of Egypt, you have prepared a cross for your savior.

Choir and people sing or say alternate phrases; or first and second choir sing or say alternate phrases.

Holy God. (twice)

Holy, mighty One. (twice)

Holy, immortal One, have mercy on us. (twice)

Choir: Because I led you out through the desert forty years,

and fed you with manna,

and brought you into a very good land, you have prepared a cross for your savior.

Choir and

People: Repeat Holy God mercy on us.

Choir: What more should I have done, and did it not?

Behold I have planted you as my fairest vine, and you have become very bitter to me,

for you have quenched my thirst with vinegar,

and with a lance you have pierced your savior's side.

Choir and

People: Repeat Holy God mercy on us.

Choir: For you I scourged Egypt and its firstborn,

and you have given me over to be scourged.

People: My people, what have I done to you?

or in what have I offended you?

Answer me.

Choir: I led you out of Egypt,

overwhelming Pharao in the Red Sea,

and you have delivered me to the chief priests.

People: My people Answer me.

Choir: I opened the sea before you,

and you opened my side with a lance.

People: My people Answer me.

Choir: I went before you in a pillar of cloud,

and you have haled me to the judgment hall of Pilate.

People: My people Answer me.

Choir: I fed you with manna through the desert

and you have smitten me with buffets and with lashes.

People: My people Answer me.

Choir: I gave you the water of salvation

to drink from the rock,

and you have given me gall and vinegar to drink.

People: My people Answer me.

Choir: For you I smote the kings of the Chanaanites,

and you have smitten my head with a reed.

People: My people Answer me.

Choir: I gave you a royal sceptre,

and you have given my head a crown of thorns.

People: My people Answer me.

Choir: With great power I lifted you up,

and you have hung me upon the gibbet of the cross.

People: My people Answer me.

Antiphon: We adore your cross, O Lord; we praise and glorify your holy resurrection.

For behold, by reason of that wood, joy has come into all the world.

Psalm: May God have pity on us and bless us.

May he let his face shine upon us, and have pity on us.

Repeat Antiphon.

Verses for the following hymn may be sung to the melodies for Humbly Let Us Voice Our Homage, p.203. Whether the whole hymn or only part of the hymn is sung, it is recommended that the entire antiphon, sections A and B, be sung first. Verse 10 must be sung.

- A. Faithful cross, O tree all beauteous! Tree all peerless and divine. Not a grove on earth can show us such a flower and leaf as thine.
- B. Sweet the nails, and sweet the wood, laden with so sweet a load!

PART FOUR: COMMUNION

The celebrant and the ministers put aside the black vestments and put on purple ones. They proceed in procession to the altar of reposition. During the return procession, the following antiphons are said or sung.

Antiphon I: We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you, because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Antiphon II: By a tree we were made slaves, and by the holy cross we are set free: the fruit of the tree seduced us, the Son of God has redeemed us.

Antiphon III: Savior of the world, save us: you who by your cross and blood have redeemed us, help us, we implore you, our God.

After the Blessed Sacrament is placed on the altar, the celebrant sings the introduction to The Lord's Prayer and all join in singing The Lord's Prayer, p. 20. The celebrant, after reciting some prayers, receives communion and then proceeds to distribution. During distribution, verses of Psalm 21, as in the Meditation Song for Palm Sunday, are sung.

- 1. My God, my God, look upon me: PS. 21,2-9, 18, 19, 22, 24, 32 why have you forsaken me?

- There shall be declared to the Lord a generation to come: and the heavens shall show forth his justice.

After the distribution the celebrant reads three prayers, each of which is answered:

People: Amen.

The celebrant and ministers leave.

HOLY SATURDAY

The Easter Vigil

Ever since they passed over from the slave land of Pharoah, on the anniversary of the event, the youngest member of every Jewish community or family has asked this question of the eldest: "Why is this night different from all other nights of the year?" A solemn and awesome answer is given: "This night is different because we celebrate the most important moment in the history of our people. On this night we celebrate their going forth in triumph, from slavery to freedom." Christ fulfilled this expectation. He died and arose. He "passed over" from death to life. He moved from darkness to light. He won for all mankind final freedom.

THE BLESSING OF THE NEW FIRE


The celebrant lights and then blesses the new fire before the door of the church.

Priest: The Lord be with you. People: And with your spirit.

Priest: Let us pray Through Christ our Lord.

People: Amen.

The paschal candle is then prepared and lit. Another prayer is said. The paschal candle is then carried in procession to the altar. The deacon sings three times, each time higher:



The candles of the faithful are lit from the paschal candle, which is then put in its assigned place. The deacon, after asking the blessing of the celebrant, sings the solemn Easter Proclamation. After a lengthy introduction, the solemn preface responses are sung, p. 12. The Proclamation ends:

Priest: forever and ever.

People: Amen.

After the great candle which stands for the risen Christ, the light of the world, is brought into the Church to illuminate it, the Resurrection of the Lord is solemnly proclaimed. Then follow four readings from the Old Testament.

THE READINGS

Four readings are now sung, the first is followed by a prayer; the other three are followed by canticles, then prayers.

FIRST READING

GN. 1,1-31; GN. 2,1-2

SECOND READING

EX. 14,24-31; EX.15,1

At the end of the second reading:

Canticle: I will sing to the Lord, for he is gloriously triumphant; horse and chariot he has cast into the sea. My strength and my courage is the Lord, and he has been my savior. He is my God, I praise him; the God of my father, I extol him.

The Lord crushes hostile attacks, Lord is his name!

THIRD READING

IS. 4,2-6

EX. 15, 1-3

At the end of the third reading:

Canticle: My friend had a vineyard on a fertile hillside; Is. 5, 1-2
He spaded it, cleared it of stones,
and planted the choicest vines;
Within it he built a watchtower, and hewed out a winepress.
For the vineyard of the Lord of hosts
is the house of Israel.

FOURTH READING

At the end of the fourth reading:

BAPTISMAL SERVICE

Next, literally in the midst of the litany of saints, wherein all Heaven is invited to join in our triumph, water is consecrated for those who are to be baptized. The members of the assembly renew their promises.

THE BLESSING OF THE BAPTISMAL WATER

The celebrant now blesses the water for Baptism by singing first an oration and then a preface in the ferial tone, page 12 Water is then put aside for blessing and the holy oils are put into the baptismal water. The water is then carried in solemn procession to the baptismal font, during which the following is said or sung.

Canticle: As the hind longs for the running waters, ps. 41, 2-4 so my soul longs for you, O God.

A-thirst is my soul for God, the living God.

When shall I go and behold the face of God?

My tears are my food day and night, as they say to me day after day, "Where is your God?"

The celebrant sings another oration. He then returns to the altar and leads everyone in:

The celebrant then blesses all with holy water. The chanters

then proceed with The Litany of the Saints, p.453

THE SECOND PART OF THE LITANY

The Solemn Mass of the Easter Vigil

At the end of the litany, the Lord, have mercy is begun immediately. At the solemn intonation of the Glory to God in the Highest, bells are sounded and the organ plays again.

After the reading of the epistle, the celebrant intones Alleluia. It is sung three times, each time at a higher pitch, and then repeated by all.

Priest: Alleluia. People: Alleluia.



The choir proceeds immediately.

Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, for his mercy endures forever.

Praise the Lord, all you nations; glorify him, all you peoples!

For steadfast is his kindness toward us, and the fidelity of the Lord endures forever.

This is followed immediately by the second reading.





These days are called Rogation Days or "Asking" days. For each Rogation Day except the Vigil of the Ascension there is also a special Eucharist celebration which follows the singing of the litanies and the procession, if one is held. In recent years it has been permissible to substitute other pertinent prayers for the Litany of the Saints. This litany may be found on page 451.

FEASTS OF THE SAINTS AND VOTIVE CELEBRATIONS

The Cycle of the Year presents the history of salvation and challenges us to respond to the Lord's invitation to work with Him here below to make the world slowly into His eternal kingdom. We know by now that the Cycle of the Year sets before us in wonderful totality the coming of the Lord Saviour in prophecy, in history, in mystery, and in majesty.

The Cycle of the saints came later in the development of the liturgy. Christian life evolved in response to the celebration of the Cycle of the Year. It is evidence of the successful response of Christian men and women to the challenging invitation given by the liturgy of the year, that we should honor these saints now as our holy ancestors in the Cycle of the Saints.

It is clear to us that the saints did in their day what we are trying to do now. They heard the message of God, they listened to His instruction, and tried to live up to it. They were successful because they responded to God's word and to the grace of the sacraments. In the end, they won eternal glory and victory. We recall these victories of the saints by noting their "birthdays into heaven," by hearing the scripture message (from the word of God) after which they each patterned their individual lives, and by celebrating the Eucharist. As we try to do, they drew the strength unto more perfect Christian living from the Eucharist. The calendar character of the feasts of the saints differs from the Cycle of the Year in this: The latter are fixed on the succession of the Sundays together with the celebrations which necessarily interlay the Sundays, such as Holy Week, Ascension, Christmas. The feasts of the saints are celebrated on the day of their death. For it is by the victory of death that a Saint is proved.

Often, on a certain day or Sunday there is a coincidence of important celebrations of both cycles. Rules provided by the Church and explained by the leader of the assembly in every parish or chapel will indicate which of the coinciding feasts is celebrated. These instructions are given in a booklet published annually in every diocese.

There are other Eucharistic celebrations which are neither of the Cycle of the Year nor of the Cycle of the Saints. These are called votive celebrations. In these we ask God to attend to the special needs of the Church: the sick, the dying, the dead, vocations, marriages, and those receiving other sacraments. Votive celebrations seem to have their beginning in the Ember days and the days of litanies. (See Monday before Ascension in the Cycle of the Time.)

November 30 SAINT ANDREW Apostle

Very little is known of this saint, other than that he was truly great. He accepted the Master's call to martyrdom. He is supposed to have been crucified on an X-shaped cross, called St. Andrew's cross.

This bishop was the leading hero of the Council of Nicea in 325. Athanasius faced up to the followers of Arius and insisted that Christ is the Son of God, a person of divine nature. For this conviction of the truth Athanasius was made to suffer greatly.

DAILY MASS FOR THE DEAD

The liturgy for Masses for the dead has a double character. The readings and prayers vary from Mass to Mass, but the following chants are common to all celebrations for the dead.


The Exposition

After Mass the celebrant removes the chasuble and maniple and puts on the cape. When he returns to the altar he kneels on the lowest step and incenses the Blessed Sacrament. The procession then takes place, during which suitable hymns in English are sung. It is recommended that the text of the first hymn be the first four verses of Praise We Christ's Immortal Body.

After the procession the Blessed Sacrament is placed on the throne. Verses 5 and 6 of Praise We Christ's Immortal Body, p.201, are sung and the Blessed Sacrament is incensed. Then the cantors begin the Litany of the Saints. All respond.

Each of the opening five invocations is sung by the cantors and then repeated by the people.

Verses 5 and 6 of Praise We Christ's Immortal Body, p.201 are sung and the Blessed Sacrament is incensed.

THE EUCHARISTIC LITURGY

In the Eucharistic Liturgy we ask God for strength and enlightenment (Collect Prayer). He responds by teaching and encouraging us in the message of his word (readings). We give ourselves then to the Lord in the simple gifts of bread and wine, and ask for the strength to live up to the challenge of his message. In the eucharistic prayer (Canon) he renews our redemption by recalling the effects of the sacrifice of his Son. In Holy Communion, the emptying of himself that Christ began on the cross comes into us and we are renewed in the Lord.

The correct positions for the congregation to assume during the Eucharistic Liturgy vary from one area to another. It is customary in most places that the congregation

STAND as the celebrant enters and leaves the sanctuary.

STAND whenever the celebrant addresses the congregation.

SIT during readings from the Old Testament, and during readings of Epistles, Acts of Apostles, or Apocalypse, from the New Testament.

STAND during readings of the Gospel from the New Testament.

KNEEL during the Canon.

STAND for recital of the Lord's Prayer.

THE ORDINARY OF THE MASS

Entrance Rite

ENTRANCE SONG

Turn to the Proper section and/or the Music section.

The eucharistic liturgy, the Mass, begins with song. By singing together, the assembly begins to "be of one mind" (Phil. 2:5) before the Lord. During this song the assembly renews the sacraments of Baptism and Penance by an Act of Contrition. The Entrance Song is sung or recited. The proper text is found in the Proper Section. Anothen hymn is often added.

In accordance with the judgment of the local Ordinary, the following parts of the Mass may also be in the vernacular language. If there is no entrance singing, these parts may be recited by the people and are followed by the Entrance Song proper to the day.

Priest: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the

Holy Spirit. Amen.

I will go to the altar of God.

People: I confess to almighty God, to blessed Mary ever Virgin, to blessed Michael the Archangel, to blessed John the Baptist, to the holy apostles Peter and Paul, to all the saints, and to you, father, that I have sinned exceedingly in thought, word, and deed; through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault. Therefore I beseech blessed

Mary ever Virgin, blessed Michael the Archangel,

blessed John the Baptist, holy apostles Peter and Paul, all the saints, and you, father, to pray to the Lord our God for me.

Priest: May almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you

your sins, and bring you to life everlasting.

People: Amen.

Priest: May the almighty and merciful Lord grant us pardon,

absolution, and remission of our sins.

People: Amen.

Priest: O God, you will give us life again.
People: And your people will rejoice in you.

Priest: Show us, O Lord, your kindness.

People: And grant us your salvation.

Priest: O Lord, hear my prayer.

People: And let my cry come to you.

Priest: The Lord be with you.

People: And with your spirit.

Priest: Let us pray.

The priest greets the altar, the symbol of Christ. He kisses it saying:

Lord we ask you to forgive us our sins so that we can be made worthy to enter the holy of holies with clean minds: Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

We ask you, Lord, by the holiness of the saints whose remains are here, and of all the saints, mercifully to forgive us all our sins. Amen.

As soon as he reaches his seat as president of the assembly, the celebrant invites everyone to join in the Kyrie, a part of an ancient Greek litany of intentions. It is entirely addressed to Christ the Lord. With the insistence of repetition we pray together for the needs of the whole Church and of the "church in miniature" which we are. The Kyrie has the urgency of the blind man crying out for mercy of the Lord, son of David (Mt. 20:20).

If the Kyrie is sung, turn to the Music section.

Priest: Lord, have mercy.
People: Lord, have mercy.
Priest: Lord, have mercy.

People: Christ, have mercy.
Priest: Christ, have mercy.
People: Christ, have mercy.

Priest: Lord, have mercy.
People: Lord, have mercy.
Priest: Lord, have mercy.

If it is said, the Gloria follows, a hymn in praise of the Trinity. This hymn also comes from the gospel (LK. 2:14) and the Eastern liturgy.

If the Gloria is sung, turn to the Music section.

Priest: Glory to God in the highest.

People: And on earth peace to men of good will.*

We praise you. We bless you. We worship you.

We glorify you.*

We give you thanks for your great glory.* Lord God, heavenly King, God the Father almighty.*

Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son.* Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father.* You, who take away the sins of the world,* have mercy on us.*

You, who take away the sins of the world,* receive our prayer.*


You, who sit at the right hand of the Father,* have mercy on us.*

For you alone are holy.*
You alone are Lord.*

With the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

The formation of the assembly is now ended with a formal prayer that states the intention of the celebration. The words with which the celebrant greets his brethren are inspired by Luke's gospel (1:28). He addresses himself to the people as the angel greeted Mary. Their answer, a Hebrew form of reply, recognizes the priest's share in the same holiness which they have:



The Lord be with you. And with your spir-it.

Priest: The Lord be with you. People: And with your spirit.

Priest: Let us pray

First there is a moment and suggestion for personal meditation. Then the celebrant "collects" (whence the name "Collect") the intentions of all into a prayer of the assembly.

Priest: forever and ever.

People: Amen.



The Liturgy of the Word

In response to the petition of our prayer, the Lord gives us his message as it is written in his word. This study and proclamation of the Bible, the good news, has been carried on from the ancient synagogue service. The Israelites came together to hear God's word as the Lord himself had taught them to do. Jesus took part in these assemblies (Lk. 4:16-22).

Of itself, a word is unimportant except in that it signifies a reality. God's word is more than a sign. It is the Second Person of the Trinity; it is his Son. God's word brings results, once it has been spoken or written. When God speaks, his Son is "realized" (becomes a reality); he creates (Gen. 1-2), he gives life, he heals. The assembly sits and listens to the word of God. At the end of this reading or readings, the assembly announces its happy agreement and willingness to live and act accordingly.

People: Thanks be to God.

MEDITATION SONG

Turn to the Proper section.

After the first (or second) reading, the community responds by singing or reciting the meditation proper to the day. Songs are the natural lyrical response of Bible folk to the various situations of their lives: covenant, pilgrimage, peace, war, sin and mercy. Most usually, the psalms sing of the glory of God. Christians are the new people of the Bible, children of the covenant. The psalms continue to be our best meditation on the word of God.

Priest: Cleanse my heart and my lips, O almighty God, who did cleanse the lips of the prophet Isaia with a burning coal. Grant in your gracious mercy to purify me so that I may worthily proclaim your holy Gospel: through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Pray, a blessing

May the Lord be in my heart and on my lips, that I may worthily and fitly proclaim his holy Gospel. Amen.

The proclamation of the gospel climaxes the Liturgy of the Word. The Lord has already spoken to us through the prophets and apostles. Now the Word enfleshed speaks. We Christians believe that during the gospel the Lord stands in our midst and gives us anew the good news of salvation. We respond by standing to greet the Lord at his coming.

Priest: The Lord be with you. People: And with your spirit.

Priest: A reading from the holy Gospel according to We declare our agreement and willingness to accept the message.

People: Glory to you, O Lord.

Then, after its proclamation:

People: Praise to you, O Christ.

A homily (the word means literally "a sharing") explains and applies to Christian living the message of God's word.

The liturgy of the word of God ends with a reaffirmation of a Christian faith (in some celebrations).

If the Creed is sung, turn to the Music section.

Priest: I believe in one God.

People: The Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth,* and of all things visible and invisible.*

And I believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,*

the only-begotten Son of God.

Born of the Father before all ages.*

God of God, Light of Light, true God of true God.*
Begotten, not made.*

of one substance with the Father.*

By whom all things were made.*

Who for us men and for our salvation came down from heaven.*

And he became flesh by the Holy Spirit of the Virgin Mary:* and was made man.*

He was also crucified for us,*

Suffered under Pontius Pilate, and was buried.*

And on the third day he rose again, according to the Scriptures.*

He ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of the Father.*

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead.*

And of his kingdom there will be no end.*

And I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord and

Giver of life.*

Who proceeds from the Father and the Son.* Who together with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified,*

And who spoke through the prophets.*

And one holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church.*

I confess one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.*

And I await the resurrection of the dead.*

And the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Liturgy of the Eucharist The Preparation of the Gifts

The assembly moves from the celebration of the word to the great act of the Eucharist. It first makes known to the Lord its urgent needs in the Prayer of the Faithful. After the usual greeting, the celebrant or one appointed by him asks the Lord to look after the Pope, bishops, people, the sick, the dead, etc. The form of this prayer is flexible. See examples of the Prayer of the Faithful, pages 159 — 167.

At the end, the celebrant sums it up in another prayer of the assembly, to which approval is given.

People: Amen.

SONG WHILE PREPARING THE GIFTS

Turn to the Proper section and/or the Music section.

After the litany, celebrant-president moves from pulpit or chair to the altar to begin the preparation of the gifts. Now is sung or recited the Song While The Gifts Are Prepared, proper to the day. Another hymn may be included. During the recitation or singing, the gifts, bread and wine, are brought to the altar of sacrifice. During the gift-giving rite, the celebrant accompanies every action with a personal prayer. In earlier times, there were none such. These prayers simply give a verbal dimension to what the priest is doing. They apply exclusively to him and his assistants. It is certainly fitting that every member of the assembly pray at this time to make a gift of himself; and to make known to God again, as in the Kyrie, the needs of the Church, of the assembly, and of himself. A hymn sung here is the best possible offertory prayer.

The bread is offered.

Receive, Holy Father, God almighty and everlasting, this unblemished host which I, your unworthy servant, offer to you, my living and true God, for my own countless sins, offenses, and failings; for all here present and for all faithful Christians, living and dead, that it may help both me and them unto salvation in life eternal. Amen.

The wine is prepared.

O God, in a wonderful way you created and ennobled human nature, and still more wonderfully renewed it. Grant us that by the mystery of this water and wine we may share in the Godhead of him who chose to share in our manhood: Jesus Christ your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, for ever and ever. Amen.

The cup is offered.

We offer you the cup of salvation, Lord, asking your mercy that it may ascend as a sweet fragrance in the presence of your divine majesty: for our salvation and that of the whole world. Amen.

The offering is finished.

Humble in spirit and repentant in heart, may we be accepted by you, O Lord, and may our sacrifice be so offered in your sight this day that it may be pleasing to you, Lord God.

Come, you who make holy, God everlasting and almighty, and bless this sacrifice made ready for your holy name.

During certain Masses the bread and wine are incensed. This rite shows us that the gifts are holy things set aside and given over to the worship of God. Incense is offered to honor holy things: the Eucharist, the Cross, the Gospel book, the altar, and the assembled holy people of God.

Blessing the incense, the Celebrant prays.

May the Lord be pleased to bless this incense and to accept its odor of fragrance through the prayers of the blessed Archangel Michael, who stands at the right hand of the altar of incense; and through the prayers also of all his saints: through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The gifts are incensed.

May this incense, which you have blessed, rise up to you, O Lord; and may your mercy come down upon us.

Then the Cross and the altar.

Let my prayer be like incense in your sight, O Lord; the lifting up of my hands as an evening sacrifice. Set a watch before my mouth, O Lord; a door around about my lips. Let not my heart incline to evil words: to make excuses for evil deeds.

May the Lord kindle in us the fire of his love and the flame of everlasting charity. Amen.

The Celebrant washes his hands.

I will wash my hands among the innocent, and will go round your altar, Lord. That I may hear the sound of your praise, and recount all your wondrous deeds. Lord, I have loved the beauty of your house, and the place where your glory dwells.

O God, do not destroy my soul with the wicked, nor my life with men of blood. Their hands are stained with crimes, and their right hand is filled with gifts. But as for me I have walked in innocence; redeem me and have mercy on me. My foot has stood in the right path; in the assemblies will I praise you, O Lord.

Glory be to the Father . . .

Receive, O Holy Trinity, this offering which we make to you in remembrance of the passion, resurrection and ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ, and in honor of blessed Mary, ever Virgin, of blessed John the Baptist, the holy apostles Peter and Paul, of these and of all the saints; that it may avail to their honor and our salvation. May they be pleased to pray for us in heaven, whose memory we now keep on earth: through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

The bread and wine symbolize the giving of ourselves. Bread and wine are the staff of life. Rightly they stand for human life, for ourselves. The gift-giving is ended with a solemn prayer called the "Secret," The word "secret" is used in its basic meaning. "Secreta" in Latin means "selected, set aside"; the selected gifts. The "secret" may be preceded by an invitation thereto. This can be said quietly among priest and servers.

Priest: Brethren, pray that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the Father almighty.

Servers May the Lord receive the sacrifice from your hands or to the praise and glory of his name, for our welfare

People: and that of all his holy Church.

At the end of this prayer, the assembly makes it its own by a solemn and enthusiastic "amen".

People: Amen.

The Great Eucharistic Prayer

Now the celebrant invites every member of the Christian assembly to come forward with his share in the priesthood of Christ, and to enter into the great and common act of thanksgiving which is the renewal of salvation, the eucharistic prayer. In Baptism and Confirmation, every Christian becomes another Christ. Christ is the priest. We who are other Christs, all of us, share in his priesthood. The sacrament of Holy Orders gives certain men the duty to administer sacraments and to preside over the eucharistic assembly in the sense of activating the priesthood of all. Vatican Council II makes this doctrine wonderfully clear.

A stirring dialogue begins this great action. The renewal of the effects of Christ's emptying himself is about to take place.

The introduction to the eucharistic prayer, called the Preface, can be said in our own language.

Priest: The Lord be with you.
People: And with your spirit.
Priest: Lift up your hearts.



At the celebrant's invitation, we reply by acclamation. The phrase "Holy! Holy! Lord God Saboath" is written and sung, both in Isaiah 6:3 and in the Apocalypse 4:8. The Hebrew word "Saboath" proclaims God the ruler of all cosmic forces. By calling on the choirs of angels to join this act of cosmic thanks, we call upon all creation to join us in our great act of thanksgiving. We assure creation that it will benefit by this same act.

People: Holy, holy, holy Lord God of hosts.*





The celebrant now continues the eucharistic prayer in Latin, the ancient language of our rite:

Priest: Therefore

we ask you this
Father most merciful
through Jesus Christ, your Son, our Lord.
We ask you, we beg you to take and to bless
these gifts
these tokens
these holy unspotted offerings.
In the first place
we offer them to you
for your holy Catholic Church
(throughout the whole world).
Please give her peace
guard her, gather her, guide her.

We offer them together with your servant our Pope N. together with our bishop N. and with all who faithfully teach the Catholic apostolic faith. Remember, Lord the servants of your household N. and N. and all who are assembled here around your altar. You know their faithfulness and attachment to you. We offer to you for them or they offer to you this sacrifice of praise for themselves and for all they cherish for the forgiveness of their sins for the salvation and safety in which they hope. To you do they pray God everlasting, living and true. In the fellowship of communion we honor and remember first of all the glorious Mary ever Virgin the Mother of our Lord and God. Jesus Christ. Then we recall the blessed Joseph. spouse of the Virgin and your holy apostles and martyrs Peter and Paul. Andrew, James, John, Thomas, James, Philip. Bartholomew, Matthew, Simon and Jude Thaddeus. Linus, Cletus, Clement, Sixtus, Cornelius, Cyprian. Lawrence, Chrysogonus, John and Paul. Cosmas and Damian, and all your saints. Because of their merits and prayers help and guard us in all things

Then the celebrant spreads his hands over the gifts; he shows that he accepts them in God's name as the material for the sacrifice. The words of consecration come from the very ancient church. They were possibly in use, just as we have them now, even before the gospel accounts of the institution were written. It is in the blood of Christ that God ratifies his agreement with us: the covenant, the testament. He agrees to be our Father; we, his children. This pact was first made between God and Abraham; renewed in the days of Moses, who sprinkled the Children of Israel with sacrificial victims' blood. In the new covenant between God and his people, his Church, it is the blood of Christ that seals the pact between man and his Creator; the blood and body of Christ the Lord. In the double consecration of bread into the body, and wine into the blood of Christ, we renew the separation of the Lord's blood from his body on the cross. But Christ, having died once, can die no more. It is under the signs of bread and wine that the saving effect of his giving of himself is achieved.

When we say that we recall the sacrifice of Christ, we mean that we bring the body and the blood of the Lord, together with all that his giving of himself achieved, into our dimension, into our space and time. The Eucharist is no mere commemoration like the celebration of a national festival. It really reproduces in our midst, mystically, under signs, the historic sacrifice of Christ.

The body and blood of Christ offered now on our altar has the power to atone for our sins, for our refusals, for our disobedience. For the act that we accomplish and the gift that we offer is the very obedience of the Son of God who gave himself for our salvation.

Priest: This, then, is the offering which we, your servants, and your whole family owe and give to you. Please accept it set our days in your peace save us from everlasting doom count us among your chosen ones. As for this whole offering O God please bless it please accept it and make it proper and perfect and worthy to please you so that it may become for us the Body and Blood of your dearly Beloved Son

our Lord Jesus Christ. The day before he suffered he took bread into his holy and worshipful hands and with eyes lifted up to heaven to you, God, his almighty Father giving thanks to you he blessed broke and gave it to his disciples saying "Take, eat this, all of you, For this is my Body." Likewise after the supper he also took this glorious cup into his holy and worshipful hands. He gave thanks to you again and blessed the cup and handed it to his disciples saying "Take, drink this, all of you, For this is the cup of my Blood of the new and everlasting covenant the mystery of faith. It shall be shed for you and for many to atone for sins. Whenever you do these things you will do them in memory of me."

Immediately after the consecration, the celebrant proclaims the great remembrance which the Greek Christians called Anamnesis. Here we remind the Father that the whole cycle of our redemption has been renewed in its effects in the Body and Blood of his Son; his suffering, death, burial, resurrection and ascension. This is achieved in mystery. The saving power of Christ, dead, buried, arisen and ascended is the great reality, vibrantly active under the quiet sign of bread and wine.

For this reason, O Lord, we your servants and likewise your people remember the blessed suffering of the same Christ, your Son, our Lord. We remember his rising from the abode of the dead and his going up to the glory of heaven. Mindful of all this from among the gifts you gave us we offer to your radiant majesty a victim pure, holy, spotless the sacred bread of life eternal the cup which gives salvation forever. May your face be pleased and serene and, as you look upon these gifts may you take them up as you took up the gifts of your servant Abel, a just man the sacrifice of Abraham, our patriarch and that which Melchisedech set before you a holy sacrifice, a victim without blemish. Almighty God humbly we ask you bid your holy angel to carry these gifts up to the altar which is before your heavenly majesty. This we ask so that whoever shares in receiving the most holy Body and Blood of your Son from this altar here below may be filled with every blessing and grace from heaven above. . Remember too, Lord the servants of your household N. and N. They have gone before us they are sealed with the sign of faith now they sleep the sleep of peace. Grant, O Lord, we ask you to these and to all who are at rest in Christ





The celebrant has invited us to join him and all the saints in offering the whole world, all its people, all its creatures, all its times, all its spaces, all its places, to God the Father through his Son, Jesus Christ in his holy presence in the now-consecrated bread and wine. The assembly makes the whole Eucharist Prayer its own, with a great "amen"

People: Amen.

If the Great Amen is sung, it may be selected from the following.





The Eucharistic Banquet

After the members of the assembly have made the great eucharistic prayer their own by proclaiming the great "Amen", they move into a more intimate dialogue with their heavenly Father. The celebrant leads the community in reciting the Lord's Prayer, and adds immediately thereto an extension of its last petition, a prayer asking for freedom from all sorts of evil. This formula is called the Embolism because during it a particle of the Sacred Host is mixed into the chalice. (Embolism, in Greek, means to "throw in".)

Priest: Let us pray: Taught by our Saviour's command

and formed by the word of God, we dare to say:

Priest Our Father who art in heaven,*

and hallowed be thy name;*

As he prepares to put this particle of the Host into the chalice, the celebrant calls for the peace of the Lord in the brotherhood of the assembly. Those gathered around the altar, now the banquet table of the Lord, respond.

Priest: Forever and ever.

People: Amen.

Priest: May the peace of the Lord be always with you.

People: And with your spirit.



If the Agnus Dei is sung, turn to the Music section.

People: Lamb of God, who take away the sins of the world,*

have mercy on us.*

(In Requiem Masses: grant them rest grant them rest grant them rest

The celebrant now says several private prayers to make ready for his own Holy Communion.

Lord Jesus Christ who said to your apostles: "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you" do not look upon my sins, but upon the faith of your Church. Please grant her peace and unity according to your will: you who are God living and reigning for ever and ever. Amen.

The Celebrant prepares himself for the Sacred Meal Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God, according to the will of the Father and through the help of the Holy Spirit you gave life to the world by your death. By this your most holy Body and Blood deliver me from all my sins and from all evils. Make me always cling to your commandments and never let me be separated from you: who with the same God the Father and the Holy Spirit live and reign, God, for ever and ever.

Amen.

Let not the sharing of your Body, O Lord Jesus Christ, which I unworthy make bold to receive, become my judgment and condemnation. But through your goodness may it be my safeguard and a healing remedy both of soul and body: you who live and reign with God the Father in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.

He takes the Sacred Body.

I will take the bread of heaven and call upon the name of the Lord. Lord, I am not worthy that you should come under my roof; only say the word and my soul shall be healed.

May the Body of our Lord Jesus Christ keep my spirit unto life everlasting. Amen.

He drinks the Precious Blood.

What shall I return to the Lord for all that he has given to me? I will take the chalice of salvation and call on the name of the Lord, singing his praise. I will call upon the Lord and I shall be saved from my enemies.

May the Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ keep my spirit unto life everlasting. Amen.

As soon as he has received Holy Communion, the celebrant invites his brothers and sisters to join him at the banquet of the Lord. The invitation and reply are given three times.

Priest: Behold the Lamb of God,*

behold him who takes away the sins of the world.

People: Lord, I am not worthy that

you should come under my roof.*

Speak but the word and my soul will be healed.

Before a Christian receives the body of Christ, he is reminded of what he is doing. His faith in the presence of Christ is stimulated. He accepts his responsibility to be a better Christian and to live more conformably to the Christ whom he receives, by greeting his own communion with:

Priest: The body of Christ.

Communicant: Amen.

COMMUNION SONG

Turn to the Proper section and/or the Music section.

During the communion procession, the antiphon for the day is sung or

recited. Often another hymn is added.

After all have been nourished with the Body and Blood of the Lord, the celebrant cleanses the sacred vessels

Priest: Grant, O Lord, that what we have taken with our mouth, we may receive with a pure mind: and that from a temporal gift it may become for us an eternal remedy. O Lord, may your Body which I have received and your Blood which I have drunk cleave to my inmost parts. Grant that there remain no stain of wickedness in me whom these pure and holy sacraments have refreshed: you who live and reign for ever and ever. Amen

The celebrant finally prepares for the prayer of thanksgiving. He greets the people in the usual way and says the postcommunion prayer. The people add their approval.

Afterward, the assembly is dismissed to go about its work of bringing the good news of salvation to the world, and is blessed unto this task in the name of the Trinity. The thanksgiving is often extended into the singing of another hymn, which accompanies the people of God as they prepare to go back into the world.

Priest: The Lord be with you. People: And with your spirit.

Priest: The Mass is ended. Go in peace.

(or: Let us bless the Lord.)

People: Thanks be to God.

(in Requiem Masses: May they rest in peace.

People: Amen.)



As at the end of the Preparation for the Sacrifice and at the end of the Canon, also at the end of the whole Celebration, the Holy Trinity is invoked.

Priest: O Holy Trinity, may the worship of our service be pleasing to you. Grant that the sacrifice which I though unworthy have offered in the sight of your majesty may be acceptable to you. Because of your mercy may it be helpful for me and for all those for whom I have offered it: through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Priest: May almighty God bless you, the Father, and the Son,

+ and the Holy Spirit.

People: Amen.


The Anglican system of marking psalm-tone cadences has been used throughout this section. According to this system, a psalm verse of normal length is divided into two sections, each with a cadence.

The middle cadence is a cadence of three notes in which the first note is accented. The final cadence is a cadence of five notes in which the first and third notes are accented.


The middle cadence begins on the first underlined syllable in each verse. The final cadence begins on the first underlined syllable of the second section. The syllable on the third note of the final cadence is also underlined.

Two other markings are used. A double underline indicates that a syllable should be held for two notes. An elision mark indicates that the elided (joined) syllables should be sung to one note.

SACRAMENTS: SIGNS OF LIFE; SIGNS OF GLORY

In the general introduction to this hymnal-missal, we presented the Sacraments of Christ as his means of helping us to meet the crises of our lives, to give us the grace, the nourishment and the encouragement that we need to carry on his work here below. Especially did we relate each of the sacraments to the Eucharist, the very heart of the sacramental plan. For it is in the Mystery of the Incarnation that the Word became flesh and that the Lord Christ entered into our nature. It is in the Mystery of the Eucharist especially that the Lord Christ continues to enter into our nature and come into contact with us. This is true in the other sacraments also, but the purpose of our encounters with him in these is to more deeply appreciate and realize in our lives our identity with Christ. This is primarily pledged in the Communion of the Eucharist.

The teaching on the sacraments begins, as it must, in the Bible, where the key is to be found in John's Gospel. One of the main purposes of John's message is to show the very close connection between the historical, earthly Christ, and the Christ living in the Church. The historical Christ could be recognized through his signs, his miracles. Those who live in Christ can continue to recognize him through his signs, the sacraments.

The sacraments have their beginning in historical events, also. We see that sacramental salvation is the extension of historical salvation through the one Christ as he manifests himself under the signs of the gospel: water and wine begin at Cana (John 2); water and blood begin on the Cross (John 19); bread begins in the feeding of the multitude (John 6). The water alone begins with the well of Jacob and the woman of Samaria (John 4).

Although they begin with simple historical events, the sacraments are not merely renewals of these events. The miracles of which the gospel speaks were manifestations of Christ's saving presence, of his glory. The miracles are earthly. The sacraments are spiritual. The sacraments are manifestations of the Lord's eternal and spiritual glory. After his Resurrection, the Lord gave to us the Spirit. He showed himself in the sacraments. These sacraments put us on the spiritual level, through the workings of the Spirit. Miracles have visible results. Sacraments have results in faith. Every time the Lord explains the sacraments he offers a choice: accept or refuse. Faith today is not only knowledge of the historical events of the life of Christ; it is the acceptance of the implanting of these events into the life of the Church and into our own lives. through the sacraments. And most important of all, faith in the sacraments is faith in the presence of the Lord. "I am the bread (John 6:51) I am the vine (John 15:1) "a spring of water, welling up to eternal life (John 4:14)."

However, signs mean nothing unless those who see them accept them in faith. We must bring our faith to the sacraments in order that we may be enlivened by their grace. And since faith itself comes from the Lord God Almighty, we realize again how true it is that we can do nothing without him. He gives us the faith to believe in his presence. He brings us himself, in the sacraments. This is the glory of salvation. This is the Mystery of Christ.

To be saved we must "put on the new man, created according to God (Eph. 4:24). As the parable of the wedding feast tells us, we must be wearing the white robe of God's life when the King comes in (Mt. 22). Also, to be a Christian demands growth in grace. The sacraments are the chief and proper sources of this life and growth.

The outward signs which Christ appointed for the sacraments

SACRAMENTS

are simple and meaningful: water, bread, wine, oil, contracts, and words. These signs not only serve as channels of grace, they have a meaning of their own: water cleanses; bread nourishes; oil strengthens and heals; the marriage contract binds in love; absolution forgives.

Beyond the symbolism, we must realize that we meet the saving Lord himself personally in every sacramental encounter. In this way the Mystery of Christ lives now and ever until the Parousia, the final coming. In the signs of the sacraments we "see his glory, full of grace and truth" (Jn. 1:14).

BAPTISM

Water cleanses and enlivens; it destroys and deadens. The significance of the sacrament is realized in the sign. We realize in the pool of baptismal water two figures, two representations. In the first instance, this is the watery tomb into which the sinner is buried with Christ, once he has died with him to sin. Immediately it becomes a new sign, the womb of the Church from which the Christian comes forth with Christ, a new creature endowed with his life and his image. What Baptism does in a few minutes under its signs, in mystery, is fulfilled in the dimension of time in the life, work and death, and in the resurrection of the faithful Christian.

Faith is needed before Baptism. If the candidate is too young to make an Act of Faith, his godparents supply the "faith of the whole Church" for him. Here it is important and valuable to relate Baptism to Lent. In the early Church it was during this time that candidates were given their names, final instruction, tested, and eventually baptized on Easter Saturday, in the great Vigil of Light and Life.

THE RITE OF BAPTISM First Part

(Friday of 3rd week in Lent)

If the candidate is old enough to speak, he answers for himself.

The Questioning Outside the Church

Priest: What is your name?

Sponsors: N_____.

Priest: N_____, what do you ask of the Church of God?

Sponsors: Faith.

Priest: What does faith offer you?

Sponsors: Eternal life.

SACRAMENTS

Priest:

If, then, you wish to enter into life, keep the commandments: you shall love the Lord your God with your whole heart, and with your whole soul, and with your whole mind, and your neighbor as yourself.

The "Breathing Out"

The Celebrant breathes on the candidate. This "breath of the Church" stands for the power of the Holy Spirit:

Priest:

Depart from him (her), unclean spirit, and give place to the Holy Spirit, the Consoler.

The Sign of the Cross

Priest:

Receive the mark of the Cross on your forehead and within your heart. Embrace the faith with its divine teachings. So live that you will indeed be a temple of God.

Let us pray.

We beg you, Lord God, graciously hear our prayers. Guard your chosen one, N_, with the never-failing power of the Cross of Christ, with which he (she) has been marked. Protect him (her) so that . . . he (she) may . . . attain to the glory of a new birth. Through Christ our Lord.

People:

Amen.

The Laying On of Hands

A sign of acceptance by the Church.

Priest.

Let us pray. (Summary)

Almighty and eternal God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, look with favor upon this your servant . . . Take from him (her) all blindness of heart. . . . Then, seasoned by the salt which is symbolic of

your wisdom, may he (she) be relieved of the corruption of evil desires . . . Through the same Christ

our Lord.

People: Amen.

Presentation of Salt

The Celebrant puts a little blessed salt into the candidate's mouth. Salt is the symbol of that wisdom which gives a relish for the goodness of divine nourishment. Salt is a precious gift where it is rare. In the near East it is still offered to honored guests when they arrive at the gate of a home.

Priest: N_, receive the salt, which is a symbol of wisdom.

May it bring you God's favor for life everlasting.

People: Amen.

Priest: Peace be with you.

People: And with your spirit.

Priest: Let us pray. (Summary)

God of our fathers, God, the author of all truth, we humbly ask you to look with favor on this your servant N_, who has had his (her) first taste of blessed food in the form of salt. Satisfy him (her) with the bread of heaven . . . We ask you, Lord, to lead him (her) to the waters in which he (she) will be born again . . . Through Christ our Lord.

People: Amen.

Second Part

(Wednesday of 4th week in Lent)

Exorcism Priest:

I exorcise you, unclean spirit, in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Come forth, depart from this servant of God, N_, for he commands you, accursed and damned spirit, he who walked upon the sea and extended his right hand to Peter as he was sinking.

SACRAMENTS

Therefore, accursed devil, acknowledge your condemnation and pay homage to the true and living God; pay homage to Jesus Christ, his Son, and to the Holy Spirit, and depart from this servant of God, N., for Jesus Christ, our Lord and God, has called him (her) to his holy grace and blessing, and to the font of baptism.

The Sign of the Cross

Priest: Accursed devil, never dare to desecrate this sign

of the Holy Cross which we are tracing upon his (her) forehead. Through the same Christ our Lord.

People: Amen.

Laying On of Hands

Priest: Let us pray. (Summary)

Lord, holy Father, almighty and eternal God, source of all light and truth, I humbly beg your never-ending and most holy mercy upon this servant of yours, N.... so that he (she) may be made worthy of the grace of your baptism . . . Through Christ our Lord.

People: Amen.

The Admission Into The Church

The Celebrant lays the end of the stole on the candidate. This is a symbol of the Church of Christ taking him into the care of the assembly.

Priest: N_, enter the temple of God, so that you may have

part with Christ in everlasting life.

People: Amen.

The Great Profession

After they have come into the Church, the candidate or the godparents (sponsors) pray and proclaim the Apostle's Creed and the Lord's Prayer.

Our Father . . .

Third Part

(Holy Saturday morning)

The Solemn Exorcism

Priest:

I exorcise you, every unclean spirit, in the name of God, the Father almighty, and in the name of his Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord and judge, and in the strength of the Holy Spirit, that you may depart from this creature of God, N_, whom our Lord has called to his holy temple in order that he (she) may become a temple of the living God, and that the Holy Spirit may dwell in him (her). Through the same Christ our Lord, who will come to judge the living and the dead and the world by fire.

People: Amen.

The Ephpheta

The Celebrant signs the ears and nose to dispose the senses to be sensitive to the word and will of God. He uses the same healing word as the Lord used (Mark 7:34).

Priest:

Ephpheta, which means "Be opened," so that you may perceive the fragance of God's sweetness. But you, O devil, depart; for the judgment of God has come.

The Renunciation of Satan

Priest: N_, do you renounce Satan?

Sponsors: I do renounce him.

Priest: And all his works?

Sponsors: I do renounce them.

Priest: And all his allurements?

Sponsors: I do renounce them.

The Anointing

The Celebrant anoints the candidate with the oil of catechumens. Oil signifies the conferral of health and power.

Priest: I anoint you with the oil of salvation in Christ

Jesus our Lord, so that you may have everlasting

life.

People: Amen.

Fourth Part

Easter Vigil

The Last Profession of Faith

The Celebrant takes off the violet stole and puts on a white one. This ceremony comes from the Easter Vigil, when the Church lays aside the vesture of penance to put on the robes of joy.

Priest: N_, do you believe in God, the Father almighty,

creator of heaven and earth?

Sponsors: I do believe.

Priest: Do you believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our

Lord, who was born into this world and who

suffered?

Sponsors: I do believe.

Priest: Do you believe also in the Holy Spirit, the holy

Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body and

life everlasting?

Sponsors: I do believe.

Baptism

Baptism is administered in the name of the Holy Trinity, according to the Lord's words: "Go therefore, make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." (Mt. 28:19)

BAPTISM

Priest: N___, do you wish to be baptized?

Sponsors: I do.

Priest: (pouring baptismal water a first time)

I baptize you in the name of the Father,

(pouring water a second time)

and of the Son,

(pouring water the third time)

and of the Holy Spirit.

The Anointing With Chrism

This special Holy Oil stands for the conferral of Kingly power. See 1 Peter 2:9.

Priest: May almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus

Christ, who has given you a new birth by means of water and the Holy Spirit and forgiven all your sins, (here he anoints) anoint you with the Chrism of salvation in the same Christ Jesus our Lord, so

that you may have everlasting life.

People: Amen.

Priest: Peace be with you.

People: And with your spirit.

The White Robe

This garment is a powerful sign of Christian dignity. It is urged that a real robe be provided here not just a meaningless towel.

Priest: Receive this white garment. Never let it become

stained, so that when you stand before the judgment seat of our Lord Jesus Christ, you may have

life everlasting.

People: Amen.

The Lighted Candle

The candle is a sign of Christ with whom the new Christian has risen alive with the life of grace. The Easter candle often stands near the baptistry to add light to this signification.

SACRAMENTS

Priest: Receive this burning light, and keep the grace of your Baptism throughout a blameless life. Observe

the commandments of God. Then, when the Lord comes to the heavenly wedding feast, you will be able to meet him with all the saints in the halls of

heaven, and live forever and ever.

People: Amen.

Dismissal

As he will be at the end of every celebration of the Holy Eucharist, the Christian is here challenged to witness to Christ before the world.

Priest: N_, go in peace, and the Lord be with you.

People: Amen.

CONFIRMATION AND HOLY ORDERS

CONFIRMATION

A person being confirmed must, as in all sacraments, understand its meaning and grace before he can fulfill his new status, before he can respond to his responsibility as a confirmed Christian.

Confirmation truly fulfills Baptism. It gives Christian maturity to the child of God, born in Baptism. Like Baptism, this gift bestows a permanent character or status. This lasting "mark" becomes the lifelong source of strengthening grace for the confirmed. Though Confirmation is certainly a separate sacrament from Baptism, it continues the incorporation into Christ begun in the mystery of rebirth. In Confirmation this incorporation becomes more mature, it gains depth and breadth.

In Apostolic times we hear of the differentiation between these things: the baptism of John, Christian Baptism, and Confirmation. We read in Acts (19:1-6): "Paul passed through the upper country and came to Ephesus. There he found some disciples. And he said to them, 'Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you believed?' And they said, 'No, we have never even heard that there is a Holy Spirit.' And he said, 'Into what then were you baptized?' They said, 'Into John's baptism.' And Paul said, 'John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, Jesus.' On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. And when Paul had laid his hands upon them, the Holy Spirit came on them; and they spoke with tongues and prophesied."

Confirmation and Vocation Confirmation and Holy Orders

We stress that the confirmed Christian makes his response to the Sacrament with an awareness of his responsibility to God's Church and to the society of the world. Through Confirmation, the Lord calls every Christian to his specific work. These vocations are realized in all sorts of ways and walks.

One vocation that all have in common is the priesthood. Christ is the High Priest. When we begin to be other Christs in Baptism, we share in all that Christ is and has; in his priestly power, in his responsibility to teach and guide the Church. Peter told all Christians: "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, that you may declare the wonderful deeds of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light (I Pt. 2:9).

This sharing and responsibility are intensified in Confirmation. But in Holy Orders they reach their fullness. As Christ literally took pains to teach us, the priest is a servant, the suffering servant. By washing his apostles' feet, the Lord dramatized the servant role of all priests (lay and clerical); by his suffering he teaches that the Christian life is not easy. It is a constant struggle.

By word, work, and example, the priests of Holy Orders serve the people of God. Their special sacrament also enables them to celebrate sacred rites to give glory to God, grace to men. Through Orders they activate the priesthood of their fellow Christians, as when the whole assembly celebrates the Eucharist under the leadership of the priest-celebrant. The Sacrament of Holy Orders has three degrees: deacon, priest and bishop. The latter enjoys the honor and responsibility of the fullness of the priesthood.

The rite of Ordination is not given here. A special text for participation is always provided for those who form the assembly at an Ordination Mass.

CONFIRMATION AND HOLY ORDERS

THE RITE OF CONFIRMATION

After the renewal of baptismal promises (page 112, if this is to be done) the bishop says:

Bishop: May the Holy Spirit descend upon you and the power

of the Most High preserve you from sin.

People: Amen.

With his right hand he signs himself with the sign of the cross.

Bishop: Our help is in the name of the Lord.

People: Who made heaven and earth.

Bishop: O Lord, hear my prayer.

People: And let my cry come to you.

Bishop: The Lord be with you.

People: And with your spirit.

With his hands extended toward those to be confirmed:

Bishop: Let us pray.

Almighty and eternal God, who in your kindness gave to these your servants a new birth through water and the Holy Spirit, and granted to them remission of all their sins; send forth from heaven upon them your

sevenfold Spirit, the Holy Consoler.

People: Amen.

It is interesting to note that the names of these gifts are taken from the Old Testament: Isaiah 11:2.

Bishop: The Spirit of wisdom and understanding.

People: Amen.

Bishop: The Spirit of counsel and fortitude.

People: Amen.

Bishop: The Spirit of knowledge and piety.

People: Amen.

Bishop: Mercifully fill them with the Spirit of your fear, and

seal them with the sign of the cross of Christ, that they may obtain everlasting life. Through the same

Jesus Christ, your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, forever and ever.

Amen. People:

The bishop inquires the names of those to be confirmed. Each one is presented to him by a sponsor, and the candidate is given the sacrament by name.

Bishop: N___, I sign you with the sign of the cross.

While he is saying this, his right hand is imposed on the head of the candidate, and with his thumb he makes the sign of the cross on the candidate's forehead.

Bishop: And I confirm you with the Chrism of salvation. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

The newly confirmed: Amen.

Touching him gently on the cheek, a "greeting of peace,"

Bishop: Peace be with you.

After the anointing the bishop washes his hands while the following antiphon is recited or sung.





THE SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE

The sign of this rite is quite different from the water of Baptism, from the bread and wine of the Eucharist. It is the actual contract itself. This holy agreement stands for God's covenant with his people. More immediately, it realizes the oneness of Christ and his Church. As his love for the Church makes the Lord-Bridegroom one with her, so the love that husband and wife have for each other converts them into a living image, a realization of the Church. Every married couple, every family, is a miniature Church. Both lessons of the marriage celebration describe this oneness in covenant which is the sacrament itself. Paul says, "Even so husbands should love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. For no man ever hates his own flesh, but nourishes and cherishes it, as Christ does the Church, because we are members of his Body. For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one. This is a great mystery, and I mean in reference to Christ and the Church; however, let each one of you love his wife as himself, and let the wife see that she respects her husband" (Eph. 5:28-33).

Matthew's Gospel adds, "So they are no longer two, but one. What therefore God has joined together, let no man put asunder" (Mt. 19:6).

Paul has just said, "This is a great mystery . . ." We recall that "mystery" here means sacrament. Husband and wife are outward signs of the union between Christ and his Church. This is the Sacrament of Marriage.

THE RITE OF MARRIAGE (During the Nuptial Mass)

The sacrament is given after the Second Reading and before the Prayer of the Faithful.

Priest: N, do you take N, here present, for your lawful wife according to the rite of our holy mother, the Church?

Groom: I do.

BLESSING OF CONTRACT

Priest: By the authority of the Church I ratify and bless the bond of marriage you have contracted. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

People: Amen.

Priest: I call upon all of you here present to be witnesses of

this holy union which I have now blessed. "Man must

not separate what God has joined together."

People: Amen.

BLESSING OF RINGS

Priest: Our help is in the name of the Lord.

People: Who made heaven and earth.

Priest: O Lord, hear my prayer.

People: And let my cry come to you.

Priest: The Lord be with you. People: And with your spirit.

Prayer (for two rings)

Let us pray. (Summary)

Priest: Bless, O Lord, these rings, which we are blessing in

your name, so that they who wear them . . . may live together always in mutual love. Through Christ our

that you lavish on them be returned a hundredfold.

People: Amen.

Priest: May the peace of Christ dwell always in your hearts

and in your home; may you have true friends to stand by you, both in joy and in sorrow. May you be ready with help and consolation for all those who come to you in need; and may the blessings promised to the compassionate descend in abundance on your house.

People: Amen.

Priest: May you be blessed in your work and enjoy its fruits.

May cares never cause you distress, nor the desire for earthly possessions lead you astray; but may your hearts' concern be always for the treasures laid up

for you in the life of heaven.

People: Amen.

Priest: May the Lord grant you fullness of years, so that you

may reap the harvest of a good life, and after you have served him with loyalty in his kingdom on earth, may he take you up into his eternal dominions in heaven. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, his Son, who lives and reigns with him in the unity of the Holy

Spirit, God, forever and ever.

People: Amen.

After the sacrament has been conferred, the eucharistic liturgy continues. See the Prayer of the Faithful (for marriage), p. 166.

NUPTIAL BLESSING

Immediately after the Our Father, the priest stands before the altar at the epistle side. Facing the couple, he says the following prayers over them.

Listen with favor, O Lord, to our prayers, and graciously uphold the institution of marriage established by you for the continuation of the human race, so that they who have been joined together by your authority may remain faithful together by your help. Through Jesus Christ.

People: Amen.

Let us pray.

O God, by your mighty power you made all things where before there was nothing; you put in order the beginnings of the universe and formed for man, made to your image, an inseparable helpmate, woman. You gave woman's body its origin from man's flesh, to teach that it is never right to separate her from the one being from whom it has pleased you to take her.

O God, you consecrated the union of marriage, making it a sign so profound as to prefigure in the marriage covenant the mystery of Christ and the Church.

O God, you join woman to man and give to that society, the first to be established, the blessing which alone was not taken away in punishment for original sin or in the doom of the Flood:

Look with kindness on this your servant who is to be joined to her husband in the companionship of marriage and who seeks to be made secure by your protection.

May this yoke that she is taking on herself be one of love and peace. May she be faithful and chaste, marrying in Christ, and may she always imitate the holy women: may she be the beloved of her husband, as was Rachel; wise, as was Rebecca; long-lived and loyal, as was Sara.

May the author of sin have no mastery over her because of her acts. May she hold firm to the faith and the commandments. Faithful to one embrace, may she flee from unlawful companionship. By firm discipline may she fortify herself against her weakness. May she be grave in her modesty,

honorable in her chastity, learned in the teachings of heaven. May she be rich in children, may she prove worthy and blameless, and may she attain in the end to the peace of the blessed, the kingdom of heaven.

May she and her husband together see their children's children to the third and fourth generation and enjoy the long life that will fulfill their desires. Through Jesus Christ.

People: Amen.

After the dismissal, the priest turns to the couple and says:

May the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, the God of Jacob be with you, and may he fulfill in you his blessing, so that you may see your children's children to the third and fourth generation and afterward possess everlasting and boundless life. Through the help of our Lord Jesus Christ, who with the Father and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, God, forever and ever.

People: Amen.

THE SACRAMENTS OF HEALING

That redemption means healing was well known to our ancestors of Israel. The prophets told them this, over and over again. They said that God's servant, the Redeemer, would heal all the ills of mankind; that he would atone for these ills by suffering himself. This is why the Lord Savior was called God's Suffering Servant. In Isaiah 53 we read: "He (the suffering servant) was despised and rejected by men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief; and as one from whom men hide their faces he was despised and we esteemed him not. Surely he has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows; yet we esteemed him stricken, smitten by God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities; upon him was the chastisement that made us whole, and with his stripes we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all." In other words, pain would pay for pain. The Jews understood that physical evil, sickness, was somehow connected with moral evil, sin. They did not think of man's body and soul as separate elements. To them he was a whole, a total person. Bodily and spiritual illnesses were related.

When the suffering servant did come and fulfilled the prophets, he made it very clear that his work was indeed the whole man: "Your sins are forgiven take up your bed and walk" is typical of the many "total healings."

The work of redemption goes on in the Mystery of Christ, in his saving presence in the signs of the sacraments. The healing of the Lord is pledged in Baptism, the very beginning of life; in Penance, the renewal of Baptism; in Anointing the transformation of sinful suffering into the victorious pain of another Christ; in Holy Communion, the food that revives one from the weakness of suffering, or the suffering of weakness.

Sin is illness; forgiveness is healing. Sin results from faulty judgment that leads to the suffering of moral pain. Sickness results from a faulty organism that leads to the suffering of physical pain. In the Sacrament of Penance, moral pain is relieved by being taken into the sufferings of Christ. In Anointing, the Christian's physical pain becomes a part of the sufferings of Christ.

THE SACRAMENT OF PENANCE

It is the nature of sin that the sinner goes his own way. He leaves the healthy way of the Lord and seeks an uncertain (sinful) way of his own. That is why the prophet said, "All we like sheep have gone astray; and we have turned every one to his own way . . ." Therefore, it is in the nature of forgiveness to be converted back to the way of the Lord; to respond to the special grace whereby the stray sheep are called back to the fold, to the Lord's path.

Also, the stray sheep leaves the community. By his absence its strength is diminished. By his sinfulness its moral fiber is weakened. And so, in the Sacrament of Penance sin is forgiven and the sinner restored to the community, to the assembly of his brethren. It is a sacrament both of forgiveness and reconciliation. To the Sacrament of Penance, the sinner must bring his sins, his sorrow, his faith. In giving this sacrament to the penitent Christian, the priest has a dual role. He represents Christ himself, who forgives sin; he represents Christ in his Church (the assembly) to welcome back, to reconcile, a straying sheep.

Sorrow and faith are obviously needed. One must be sincerely sorry for his sins. He must fully resolve to try his best not

to do them again. He must believe in the power of Christ to forgive sin, the power represented and communicated to him through the ordination of the priest-confessor. The things we confess are those that we have left undone but ought to have done; those things that we have done, and ought to have left undone.

Frequency of confession. In Christian life there is much weakness, much sickness. We need to convert ourselves back to the way of the Lord, ever so frequently. We must remember, of course, that it is God's grace that first moves us to seek the sacraments of forgiveness and reconciliation; further grace accomplishes the actual purpose of the sacrament. As to how often the Christian should go to the Sacrament of Penance, this is a question which each must answer for himself. It depends upon the testimony of his own conscience; the problems of his own life.

Now an important note about the state of grace. It is altogether true that even a grave sin is forgiven at once when the sinner declares his sorrow and conversion back to the Lord's way, promises to receive the Sacrament of Penance as soon as possible, and realizes that he is doing all this in response to an inviting grace. However, before receiving the Eucharist or any other Sacrament of the Living, he must first receive absolution in the Sacrament of Penance (except in urgent circumstances) in order to be properly reconciled to the assembly of the brethren.

THE EXAMINATION OF CONSCIENCE

Although thinking about our sins certainly is a sign that we are on the way to conversion, we must not forget that we convert ourselves to the Lord.

THE GREATEST LAW: You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart . . . You shall love your neighbor as yourself.

DEUT. 6:5: LEV. 19:18

THE DECALOGUE:

EX. 20:2-17; DT. 5:6-21

- 1. I am the Lord your God. You shall not have strange gods before me.
- 2. You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain.
- 3. Remember to keep holy the Lord's day.
- 4. Honor your father and your mother.
- 5. You shall not kill.
- 6. You shall not commit adultery.
- 7. You shall not steal.
- 8. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.
- 9. You shall not desire your neighbor's wife.
- 10. You shall not desire your neighbor's goods.

THE LAWS OF THE CHURCH

- 1. Attend Mass and refrain from unnecessary and demeaning work on Sundays and holy days of obligation.
- 2. Fast and abstain on the days appointed.
- 3. Go to confession at least once a year.
- 4. Receive Holy Communion during Eastertime.
- 5. Contribute to the support of the Church.
- 6. Observe the laws of the Church concerning marriage.

CONFESSION AND CONTRITION

A suggested formula.

Penitent: Bless me Father, for I have sinned.

Make the sign of the Cross while the priest blesses you.

Penitent: Before you, I confess to Almighty God and the whole Church that I have sinned

Tell your sins as they are in your mind; that is, as they appear to you, according to your own feeling about them. Don't let compulsive worries or scruples becloud your judgment here!

Penitent: For these and all my sins, I am heartily sorry, and I promise to convert my way of life. I humbly ask pardon of God, and that you, Father, confirm my reconciliation with God and the Church.

Here the confessor usually encourages and directs the penitent along the way of perfection.

THE ABSOLUTION

*Priest: May almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you

your sins, and bring you to life everlasting.

Penitent: Amen.

Priest: May the almighty and merciful Lord grant you par-

don, absolution, and remission of your sins.

Penitent: Amen.

The sacred minister, through the power given to him by the Church, in the name and in the person of Christ, establishes your new righteousness in the words of absolution.

Priest: May our Lord Jesus Christ absolve you, and by his authority I absolve you from every bond of excommunication, and interdict, to the extent of my power

and your need.

While saying this, the priest lifts up his right hand — a remnant of the laying on of hands done by the bishop in sign of reconciliation of the public penitent in medieval times. Now making the sign of the Cross (and the penitent should do the same), he says the form of the sacrament.

Priest: Finally I absolve you from your sins, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Penitent: Amen.

*Priest: May the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ, the merits of the Blessed Virgin Mary and of all the saints, and also whatever good you do and evil you endure be cause for the remission of your sins, the increase of grace, and the reward of everlasting life.

Penitent: Amen.

*The first and last prayers may be omitted. To each formula the penitent joins his approval and acceptance of responsibility by a meaningful Amen.

SATISFACTION FOR SINS

Without our cooperation, we cannot be converted by the Sacrament of Penance. The priest leads us to the way of conversion by prescribing a remedy, the "penance." We begin to enter into this way of conversion by accepting and doing the penance.

THE SACRAMENTS FOR THE SICK

The Anointing of the Sick (with Penance and Holy Communion)

What has been said in the introductory paragraphs about the sacraments of healing should explain quite completely why a seriously sick Christian needs all three: Anointing, Penance, the Eucharist. The Sacrament of Anointing was formerly called Extreme Unction, or the Last Anointing. However, this designation was misleading since it seemed to mean something to be done just before death. Happily, Vatican Council II has changed the name of this holy gift to the Anointing of the Sick. It is a rite which may be celebrated for anyone who is seriously ill, or it may be given often during an illness. This sacrament is a consecration and recognition of the good works done by the suffering Christian. Its anointing joins and consecrates the pains of the Christian to the suffering of Christ. He is strengthened to "make up in his own body what is lacking to the sufferings of Christ" (Col. 1:24). Obviously it is the wish of the Church that the suffering Christian receive this sacrament when he can fully understand and appreciate its meaning and grace; when he can make use of its strengthening power. This sacrament is a sacred medicine for those who are ill. Its form was taught by James (5:14-15), in words which will appear in the rite of the sacrament following. These words give meaning to the blessing and the use of the oil of anointing.

SACRAMENTS OF HEALING

What follows is the Continuous Rite for the Sick: The Sacrament of Penance, Anointing, Viaticum (or Communion of the sick).

As he enters, the Celebrant says:

Priest: Peace to this house.

People: And to all who dwell herein.

He places the Blessed Sacrament on the table and sprinkles the place with holy water.

Priest: Sprinkle me, O Lord, with hyssop, and I shall be

purified; wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow.

Priest: Our help is in the name of the Lord.

People: Who made heaven and earth.

Priest: The Lord be with you.

People: And with your spirit.

Priest: Let us pray. (Summary)

As I enter here with a sense of my own unworthiness, O Lord Jesus Christ, let abiding happiness enter with me; may the blessings of God and unmixed joy accompany my visit; may fruitful charity and lasting good health come with me . . . May my entry be blessed by you who are holy, you who are merciful, you who abide with the Father and the Holy Spirit forever and ever.

People: Amen.

Priest: Let us pray and beg our Lord Jesus Christ to fill with his blessings this house and all who dwell herein . . . May he save them from fear and all anxiety, and keep them safe and sound in this house. Who lives and

reigns with the Father and the Holy Spirit, God, forever and ever.

People: Amen.

Priest: Let us pray.

Hear us, Lord, holy Father, almighty and eternal God, and graciously send your holy angel from heaven to watch over, to cherish, to protect, to abide with, and to defend all who dwell in this house. Through Christ our Lord.

Sacrament of Penance

The Confiteor is said by all together. If the patient wishes to receive the Sacrament of Penance, the priest is left alone with him (her) for as long as he indicates is necessary (see p.521. for Rite of Penance).

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick

Lesson (Ideally, read by a member of the family.)

Priest: Beloved brethren, let us listen to the words of the

holy gospel according to St. Matthew, chapter 8.

Reader: At that time: After Jesus had entered Capharnaum, a centurion approached him with this request. "Lord, my boy is at home in bed paralyzed, suffering terribly." He said to him, "I will come and cure him." "Lord," replied the centurion, "I am not worthy to have you enter my house. Just give an order, and my boy will get better. I myself know how authority works. I have soldiers under me, and if I give one man the order, 'On your way,' off he goes; or another the order, 'Come here,' he comes. If'I tell my slave, 'Do this,' he does it." Jesus was surprised to hear this and he remarked to his followers, "I assure you, I have never found an Israelite with faith as great as this." To the centurion Jesus said, "Go home. It shall be done in answer to your faith." The boy got better that very moment

Priest: Let us kneel down and pray.

Lord, have mercy.

People: Christ, have mercy. Lord, have mercy.

Priest: Lord, that you would visit and strengthen this sick

man (woman).

People: We beseech you, hear us.

Priest: That you would give him (her) life and health.

People: We beseech you, hear us.

Priest: That you would grant him (her) the grace of the Holy

Spirit.

People: We beseech you, hear us.

Priest: Lamb of God, who take away the sins of the world.

People: Spare us, O Lord.

Priest: Lamb of God, who take away the sins of the world.

People: Graciously hear us, O Lord.

Priest: Lamb of God, who take away the sins of the world.

People: Have mercy on us.

Priest: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the

Holy Spirit. May any power that the devil has over you be utterly destroyed, as I place my hands on you and call upon the help of the glorious and holy Mother of God, the Virgin Mary, and of her illustrious spouse, Joseph, and of all the holy angels, archangels patriarchs, prophets, apostles, martyrs, confessors, vir-

gins, and all the saints. Amen.

The Celebrant takes the holy oil and anoints the sick person.

Priest: May the Lord forgive you by this holy anointing and his most loving mercy whatever sins you have committed by the use of your sight (hearing, smell, taste

and speech, touch, ability to walk).

People: Amen.

When the anointings are completed.

Priest: Lord, have mercy.

People: Christ, have mercy. Lord, have mercy.

Priest: Our Father and lead us not into temptation.

People: But deliver us from evil.

Priest: Save your servant.

People: Who trusts in you, my God.

Priest: Send him (her) help, O Lord, from your sanctuary.

People: And sustain him (her) from Sion.

Priest: Be a tower of strength for him (her), O Lord.

People: Against the attack of the enemy.

Priest: Let the enemy have no power over him (her).

People: And let not the son of evil dare to harm him (her).

Priest: O Lord, hear my prayer.

People: And let my cry come to you.

Priest: The Lord be with you.

People: And with your spirit.

Priest: Let us pray. (Summary)

O Lord God, you said through your apostle, James: "Is anyone sick among you? Let him bring in the priests of the Church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer of faith will save the sick man, and the Lord will raise him up, and if he be in sins, they shall be forgiven him." We implore you, our Redeemer, that by the grace of the Holy Spirit you cure the illness of this sick man (woman) and heal his (her) wounds; forgive his (her) sins, and drive away from him (her) all pains of mind and body. You who live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, God, forever and ever.

People: Amen.

Priest: Let us pray.

We implore you, O Lord, look with kindness on your servant, N_{-} , who is growing weak as his (her) body fails. Cherish the soul which you created so that,

purified and made whole by his (her) sufferings, he (she) may find himself (herself) restored by your healing. Through Christ our Lord.

People: Amen.

Priest: Let us pray. (Summary)

Lord, holy Father, almighty and eternal God . . . Be present in your kindness as we call upon your holy name. Free your servant from sickness, restore him (her) his (her) health . . . and give him (her) back to your holy Church, with all that is needed for his (her)

welfare. Through Christ our Lord.

People: Amen.

Holy Communion

Priest: Let us pray, beloved brothers, as our Lord himself

taught us.

People: Our Father (in entirety)

Priest: We beg you, O Lord, at this moment above all, to de-

liver this your servant from all evil and to strengthen him (her) with the bread of life, the Body of our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you forever

and ever.

People: Amen.

Priest: Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away

the sins of the world.

Three times.

People: Lord, I am not worthy that you should come under my

roof. Speak but the word, and my soul will be healed.

If the patient is close to death, the form of the Viaticum is used.

Priest: Receive, my brother (sister), this food for your jour-

ney, the Body of our Lord Jesus Christ, that he may guard you from the wicked enemy and lead you into

everlasting life.

Communicant: Amen.

Otherwise, Communion is given in the usual way.

Priest: The Body of Christ.

Communicant: Amen.

Priest: The Lord be with you. People: And with your spirit.

Priest: Let us pray.

O Lord, holy Father, almighty and eternal God, trustfully we beg of you that the most sacred Body of your Son, our Lord, may be a lasting remedy of both body and soul for our brother (sister) who has just received it. Through him who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit Cod, forever, and ever

unity of the Holy Spirit, God, forever and ever.

People: Amen.

All: O holy banquet, in which Christ is received, the mem-

ory of his Passion is renewed, the soul is filled with grace, and there is given to us a pledge of future glory.

Priest: You have given them bread from heaven. (Alleluia)

People: Containing in itself all delight. (Alleluia)

Priest: The Lord be with you. People: And with your spirit.

Priest: O God, who in this wonderful sacrament left us a

memorial of your Passion, grant, we implore you, that we may so venerate the sacred mysteries of your Body and Blood as always to be conscious of the fruit of your redemption. You who live and reign forever and

ever.

People: Amen.

NOTES ON THE BIBLE SERVICES

Appropriate hymns psalms should be selected to suit the general theme of the Bible Service or the particular theme expressed in the Scripture reading. Similar care should be taken to choose the most appropriate antiphon for the psalm.

Psalms may be recited or sung. When recited, people alternate on the recitation of the verses (verses 1, 3, 5, 7, etc. — left side; verses 2, 4, 6, 8, etc. — right side). When sung, choir sings verses of psalm while people sing antiphon after each verse. Certain verses of a psalm may be selected in preference to the entire psalm.

While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and went with them. But their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, "What is this conversation which you are holding with each other as you walk?" And they stood still, looking sad.

> Then one of them, named Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" And he said to them, "What things?"

> And they said to him, "Concerning Jesus of Nazareth..."

And he said to them, "O foolish men, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" And beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them in all the scriptures the things concerning himself

So they drew near to the village to which they were going. He appeared to be going further, but they constrained him, saying, "Stay with us, for it is toward evening and the day is now far spent." So he went in to stay with them.

When he was at table with them, he took the bread and blessed, and broke it, and gave it to them. And their eyes were opened and they recognized him; and he vanished out of their sight. They said to each other, "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he opened to us the scriptures?"

And they rose that same hour and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven gathered together and those who were with them, who said, "The Lord has risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!" Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he was known to them in the breaking of the bread.

As they were saying this, Jesus himself stood among them, and said to them, "Peace to you."

Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Christ should suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins should be preached in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things. And behold, I send the promise of my Father upon you; but stay in the city, until you are clothed with power from on high."

Then he led them out as far as Bethany, and lifting up his hands he blessed them. While he blessed them, he parted from them and was carried up into heaven. And they worshiped him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy, and were continually in the temple blessing God.

Religion seems irrelevant and unimportant for this life.

Perhaps we make money, pleasure, sex, status, and reputation our god.

How much are we influenced for good or evil by our environment?

Our preoccupation with the things of the world makes it hard for us to listen to Christ and what he has to say to us.

In fact, we fail to realize the purpose why Jesus came to earth.

Left: Lord Jesus,/in the past we have been too satisfied/ with external religious activity, / such as not eating meat on Friday, / going to Mass on Sunday, / fasting on the prescribed days. / We have not brought forth from our inner personality / a true commitment to you and your teachings.

Right: Lord Jesus, / you do not want merely strict conformity to laws. / You want the full dedication of all that is most personal in us. / How little we have thought of this!

Right: Lord Jesus, / the allure of wealth, ease, and belonging to a group, / seem to draw from us a deeper commitment than you do.

Lord Jesus, there are many factors in our lives which have killed our enthusiastic and wholehearted commitment to you and your teaching. Religion has been relegated to a shelf in our lives. Our whole personalities have not been involved; we have made a mere mental acceptance of formulas, often without thinking. We have shrunk from the challenge and responsibility of personal commitment and involvement. Let those days be gone forever. You said many times that he who is not with you is against you. Show us, O Lord, what we must do. Send your Spirit to guide us in fulfilling our role in the modern day world.

Priest: Let us pray. Lord Jesus, each of us knows what it is to long for happiness and security. We believe that you came to earth to tell us how to achieve it. Now we feel responsible for passing on this "good news" to others, for you came "to cast fire upon the earth" and you willed that your zeal be enkindled in the hearts of your followers. Stir up in us the same vitality and spirit that drove you. Take away our fear of involvement in the struggles, sufferings, and aspirations of others. Open our minds to the movements going on all around the world, and give us the light and desire to grasp the dimensions of our world problems and aspirations. Show us when and how to contribute to the world the insights which you revealed to us, for you remain in our midst to lead the way. In whatever

position of life we find ourselves, people should know that you have spoken to us and that we have heard your word.

All: Let it be so!

CONCLUDING CEREMONY

If space permits, let the group come forward and stand before the enthroned Bible; or else, let each one stand in his ordinary place. Raising their right hands, let the group recite the following consecration after the priest.
